INTRODUCTION OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA ZONING COMMISSION HOME RULE ACT

Ms. NORTON. Mr. Speaker, today, I introduce the District of Columbia Zoning Commission Home Rule Act. This bill would give the District of Columbia the authority to appoint all members of the D.C. Zoning Commission (Commission). Currently, the membership of the Commission consists of two federal officials the (the Architect of the Capitol (AOC) and the Director of the National Park Service (NPS)) and three members appointed by the D.C. mayor, subject to D.C. Council approval. Federal officials are members of the Commission even though the Commission has no authority over federal property.

Land use is a quintessential local matter. Despite the D.C. Home Rule Act, which gave

D.C. authority over local matters, 40 percent of the members of the Commission are federal officials, who are not accountable to the more than 700,000 D.C. residents. The federal government would lose nothing under this bill because the federal government's land-use interests in the Nation's capital are protected by federal law and federal agencies.

The Commission creates the zoning maps and regulations, which must "not be inconsistent with the comprehensive plan for the national capital." The mayor is responsible for the local elements of the comprehensive plan, subject to Council approval. The National Capital Planning Commission (NCPC), which is the central planning agency for the federal government in D.C. and approves federal projects in D.C., is responsible for the federal elements of the comprehensive plan. This bill would not alter the comprehensive plan process or the authority of NCPC and the Commission.

This bill would immediately remove the AOC and the NPS Director from the Commission, and the Commission would, at least initially, consist solely of three mayoral appointees. D.C. would have the authority to reconstitute the membership of the Commission through local legislation.

This bill is an important step to increase D.C. home rule. I urge my colleagues to support this bill.

Mr. MOYLAN. Mr. Speaker, it is with great pleasure to honor the life of Ms. Alfonsina Diaz—a World War II survivor; lifelong educator; a woman of God; mother, grandmother, and great grandmother to her family and community; and most importantly, her legacy of 100 years of life that demonstrate the values of spiritual strength and the significance of family.

Known to her family and friends as Ancin, she is the eldest of six children born to Maria Santos Tanaka Diaz and Joaquin Flores Diaz. Despite her childhood and much of her youth remembering the painful occupation of the Japanese during World War II, she intentionally lives and chooses to carry her life with the spirit of resilience and joy. A fond memory of her youth includes working alongside her sister Cecilia Tanaka Diaz Reves, first cousin Matilde Cruz Baron, and aunt Asuncion Tanaka Santos at Tommy's Soda Fountain. Owned by her uncle Tom Santos Tanaka, Sr. and father Joaquin Flores Diaz, it was a popular spot for the teenagers during the 1950's. She always had fun when she worked.

After graduating from high school, she worked at C.L. (previously Sinajana) Elementary as an elementary school teacher for the 1st to 3rd grades. She met her husband and they've stayed together since marrying in June of 1950. When they moved to Agana Heights, they've welcomed their seven children: Carmelita, Robert, Marie, Joaquin, Martha, Daniel, and Nora. As she raised her family, she continued to be a full-time teacher.

The love she had for her job can be felt through her previous and present students—

many of which have shared fond memories during their time together. About 10 years ago. a former student accidentally bumped into Ancin and asked for a picture. He intended to share it with his friends in Los Angeles who all went to the same elementary school. Another student, who is now a proud retired registered nurse, shared her experiences with Ancin. She shares that when she was in 3rd grade, Ancin had a patient and nurturing demeanor that made learning fun and easy. She was also the pioneer for many of these students "firsts"first person to introduce students to the Scholastic Book Club, fostering the love of reading classics; first person to take them on a field trip to Fena Dam/Lake; etc.

Another fond memory a student shared was the performance during the Christmas Pageant, where everyone dressed as angels with tinsel halos and wings and sang to their hearts content. She was also noted to have the best dresses.

Moreso, she was best remembered in awe for her strength and passion of raising a family of seven while being a full-time educator in an era where it was considered progressive at the time.

Her influence reached beyond her students started many of the traditions that her family has come to love. Her daughter recalls one specific tradition of setting up and reciting the Nobena Nino every year on the front porch. The Nativity they used was given to Ancin by her mom and is now with her grandniece Norene Reyes Aldridge. Her children and her grandchildren credit Ancin for their love of dancing and for the recipe for the best homemade flour titiyas served during large celebrations

Although she was the oldest, only she and her youngest sibling Maria Tanaka Diaz Nauta remain. She has survived all three of her sons yet remains loving and faithful. Her eyes and smile speak genuinely when she bids goodbye with a "Thank you, God bless you."

Ancin attributes her longevity to two things: physical activity, and interaction with others, especially with the youth. Two wonderful lessons I think we can all take away from such a life well-lived centered on family and intentionally finding gratitude in every day.
