Mr. KEATING. Mr. Speaker, I rise today in honor of Scott Acone, as he retires from the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

Scott first began what would be an extensive career with the New England DistrIct of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) as an intern in 1988. Following the internship, Scott took on a full-time role as a hydraulic engineer with the Water Control Branch, where he performed critical hydrologic and hydraulic analyses for project planning and design, while also taking on the responsibility of managing the New England District's Periodic Inspection Program for dams and hurricane barriers. During this time, Scott became the New England District's expert on ice engineering, responding to numerous ice jam events throughout the 1990s.

In 1999, Scott transitioned to a project management role, where his leadership skills quickly proved to be an asset. As a project manager, and later as Chief of the Military and Environmental Project Management Branch starting in 2010, Scott oversaw several projects that received significant recognition, including the Eastland Woolen Mill Superfund Site, which was awarded both the 2003 National Honor Award for Engineering Excellence from the American Council of Engineering Companies and the 2004 Build America Award for Environmental Remediation from

the Associated General Contractors of America

In 2013, Scott was promoted to Chief of the Engineering and Planning Division, where he led 140 technical and administrative professionals in planning water resource, environmental, and military projects across New England. Scott was later named Chief of the Programs and Project Management Division in 2016. In this role, Scott oversaw an annual budget of \$500 million in projects across USACE's business lines.

Throughout his career, Scott contributed to many notable projects, including the Elizabeth Mine Superfund Site in Vermont and the Central Artery and Tunnel Stem to Stern Safety Review of the Big Dig Project. Scott's efforts also extended beyond U.S. borders when he provided engineering oversight and review to the Millennium Challenge Corporation for the rehabilitation and raising of the Nacala Dam, an earthen dam in Mozambique, to provide additional clean drinking water to the region.

An engineering professional committed to improving infrastructure throughout New England, Scott is a graduate of the USACE North Atlantic Division's Executive Leadership Development Program and is a member of the US ACE North Atlantic Division Regional Management Board and the Society of American Military Engineers. Scott has been awarded several awards recognizing his efforts, including the Joint Civilian Service Achievement Award and the Superior Civilian Service Award.

In addition to Scott's assigned duties and responsibilities with the New England District, Scott volunteered and lent his knowledge and expertise to the USCAE's emergency management office to help those devastated in the aftermath of disasters. Scott was deployed many times, including as part of the urban search and rescue team that responded to the 2010 earthquake in Haiti and the urban search and rescue team that responded to Hurricane Katrina. Additionally, Scott assisted the US ACE's response team following the attacks on 9/11 and the COVID—19 pandemic.

After three and a half decades of service, Scott will retire from the New England District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at the end of June. Scott has diligently served the people of New England, and I wish him many years of well-deserved happiness in retirement.

Stan's most enduring legacy, however, is his courageous role in Baker v. Vermont. As the lead plaintiff, Stan helped secure Vermont's groundbreaking civil unions law, making it the first state in the nation to grant legal recognition and benefits to same-sex couples. This landmark decision marked a turning point in the struggle for equality-a step so bold and historic that it helped lay the legal and moral foundation for marriage equality across the United States.

So many LGBTQI+ Americans today can trace their right to marry the person they love back to the courage of Stan Baker and his fellow plaintiffs, who stood up at a time when few dared to do so. His action was not only a personal stand but a transformational moment in our Nation's history-one that reshaped the legal landscape and inspired a movement.

His life was also a testament to love and partnership. Stan and his husband, Peter Harrigan, were among the first same-sex couples to enter into a civil union in Vermont-and they later married. Their story reflects both the personal and political progress that can emerge from courage and conviction.

Stan was much more than a public advocate; he was a lover of music, a collector of books and fountain pens, a cello and guitar player, and a person of deep faith and generosity. He is survived by his husband Peter, whose grief is shared by all of us who knew and admired Stan.

Today, we remember Stan Baker-not only for the victories he helped achieve, but for the kindness he expressed, the communities he strengthened, and the hope he inspired.

I urge my colleagues to join me in honoring his memory and recommitting ourselves to the values he embodied: justice, dignity, and love for all. May his life continue to guide us, and may we carry forward his legacy with courage and compassion.

Mr. COHEN. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to pay a heartfelt tribute to Karanja Ajanaku, a respected reporter and editor in Memphis, who passed on Tuesday at the age of 70. A native of Natchitoches, Louisiana, who was raised in Kansas City, Dr. Ajanaku came to Memphis in 1977 right after graduating from the University of Missouri-Columbia School of Journalism as Leroy Williams Jr. He started at The Commercial Appeal as a beat reporter and was the first Black reporter to cover City Hall for the newspaper. He later became the paper's night news editor and a deputy Metro Desk editor for over 26 years. I first met Karanja, then Leroy, when he covered the general assembly while I served as his state senator. We became friends and visited often and, in the pressroom and in legislative plaza, that friendship continued for the rest of his life. I had and have nothing but the highest respect for his acumen and values. He was a first class reporter and a first class human being. In 1986, he had his name legally changed to Karanja Aidoo Ajanaku, reflecting his cultural sense of self as an agent of change, and was thereafter recognized by his colorful African dashikis. He said his adopted name meant "the guide who puts things in place." He joined The Tri-State Defender newspaper, focusing on the African American community, in 2007, and rose to be its Executive Editor before retiring in 2023. A mentor to many in those newsrooms, Dr. Aianaku was known for his grace, compassion, patience and dedication to accuracy. The Tri-State Defender, in a statement mourning his loss, said "He was committed to elevating the African American voice in this community
