Her leadership has inspired countless youth through faith, education, and purpose-driven service, organizing impactful programs and attending conferences across the country.

Dr. Margie Faye Clark is deeply dedicated to serving not only her local community but also surrounding areas across state lines. Through her nonprofit, Amarie Youth Impact, she has led numerous outreach initiatives, educational workshops, and mentorship programs that have benefited youth and families in Mississippi and beyond. As Vice President of the local NAACP chapter, she advocates for equity and justice while continuing to empower youth through Amarie Youth Impact. Her influence extends widely, driven by a mission to uplift and inspire.

Dr. Clark's life is a testimony of faith, family, and fortitude. She lives by Philippians 4:13—"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Her legacy is one of sowing seeds that continue to bear fruit in the lives of future generations.

Mr. THOMPSON of California. Mr. Speaker I rise today, along with my colleague, Mr. HUFFMAN, to honor Dr. Lynn Cominsky, an esteemed member of the Sonoma County educational community. After 39 years of service to Sonoma State University, Dr. Cominsky will assume the title of Emerita EdEon Director, marking a major milestone in her remarkable career championing public science education and outreach.

Dr. Cominsky earned her bachelor of arts in physics from Brandeis University in 1975, graduating magna cum laude with honors in chemistry. She went on to earn her Ph.D. in physics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1981. In 1986, she joined the faculty of Sonoma State University as an associate professor of physics and astronomy, becoming a full professor at the university in 1991. She served as Chair of the Department of Physics and Astronomy from 2004 to 2019, and twice as Chair of the Chemistry Department from 2005 to 2007 and again from 2018 to 2019. Through her cross-disciplinary leadership, Dr. Cominsky helped shape the academic direction of Sonoma State for nearly four decades.

Throughout her tenure, Dr. Cominsky worked to expand equity in STEM education, especially for underserved and underrepresented students. She was instrumental in supporting Sonoma State's designation as a Hispanic-Serving Institution and helped develop national resources for autistic learners. She secured tens of millions of dollars in grant funding to support inclusive science programming and reduce bias and harassment in academia.

Dr. Cominsky also founded and led EdEon STEM Learning, Sonoma State's education and outreach center focused on space and Earth science. Under her direction, EdEon developed K–14 curriculum and classroom tools that engaged students and educators in cutting-edge research and inquiry-based learning. In partnership with NASA, the National Science Foundation and the Department of Education, EdEon created innovative ways to

engage students with astrophysics, Earth science, and engineering concepts, and built professional learning communities for educators across the country. The center collaborated with NASA on missions such as Swift. NuSTAR, and Fermi, producing educator guides, simulations, and videos used nationwide. EdEon also created programming for the NSF's LIGO project and led teacher training workshops that strengthened STEM education in underserved communities.

Among her many honors, Dr. Cominsky is the recipient of the Frank J. Malina Astronautics Medal, the American Astronomical Society Education Prize, the Sally Ride Excellence in Education Award, and was elected a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Her work has been recognized nationally for advancing science edu-

cation and outreach.

Dr. Cominsky currently resides in Sonoma County. She was married to the late Garret Jernigan, with whom she shared 42 years of partnership until his passing in 2022. In addition to her professional work, she is a dedicated mentor, public speaker, and advocate for expanding access to STEM fields across communities

Connie and Bill Eastburn founded this organization by recognizing pressing needs in these Native American communities—warmth. structure, and shelter. When they learned that 17 Navajo men had tragically passed away due to inadequate shelter, Connie and Bill jumped into action. Now, partnered with numerous organizations, they have been committed to helping and improving the lives of Native Americans in the American Southwest.

One facet of ANA's outreach efforts includes programs focused on supporting the wellbeing and education of Native American children. The largest program, Food for Kids, provides schoolchildren with much-needed meals. With the help of ANA's generous donors, the program's funding skyrocketed from \$10,000 in 2004 to \$178,400 in 2024-2025. Other programs include Clothing for Kids, Eyeglass Program, and the Family and Child Education Program—all of which support and empower these children and their families.

In addition, ANA supports the education of University of New Mexico-Gallup nursing students. By providing scholarships and financial aid to aspiring Native American nurses since 2006, ANA has sponsored 349 Associate Degrees in Nursing through its Advanced Degree Scholarships-totaling \$318,278 of educational aid. By investing in the next generation of healthcare professionals, ANA helps establish pathways toward self-reliance, economic opportunity, and improved health services within these Native American communities.

Furthermore, ANA pilots a program providing free veterinary care for Native Americans and their animals on Navajo and Zuni reservations. In partnership with various Zuni organizations, ANA began construction of a fully self-sustainable veterinary clinic-a vital step toward achieving their goal of equipping these communities with the resources needed for self-sufficiency.

Americans for Native Americans continues to leave an indelible mark on the Hopi, Navaio, and Zuni Nations in the American Southwest. I rise to recognize the incredible accomplishments of this esteemed organization and I commemorate their efforts and dedication. Through the endless passion and dedication of Central Bucks County residents, this organization demonstrates their unwavering commitment to serving these communities.
