Overall, Mr. Chapman is remembered for his generous spirit, wry sense of humor, keen insight, and love of all things mechanical. In fact, one of his favorite pastimes was tinkering on engines, along with pulling weeds, long conversations on the front porch, kayaking, eating hearty meals, and rescuing animals, like Charlie the dog and Gus the goose.

Mr. Chapman was also known for his work ethic and perseverance despite the challenges faced as a polio survivor.

Today, I ask that we all take a moment to remember Ben Chapman and his contributions to his local community.

SPEAKING OUT FOR OREGONIANS

(Ms. BYNUM asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend her remarks.)

Ms. BYNUM. Mr. Speaker, it has been 6 months since I was sworn in to serve Oregon's Fifth Congressional District. Since then, we have seen the programs we rely on cut, costs rise, and the needs of the American people ignored.

That is why I always encourage Oregonians to call my office and make their voices heard. I have heard from over 50,000 Oregonians, taken over 120 constituent meetings, and held 10 townhalls, including 6 as part of my "Give 'em Hell" tour.

The stories I hear help me elevate the issues in our district and fight back, including with these floor speeches, or as I call them, protest speeches. KEEPING MEDICAID STRONG

Mr. LAMALFA. Mr. Speaker, there has been a lot of talk, just flat-out deception—you can even call it lies—about the big, beautiful bill and that we would be cutting aid to mothers, kids, seniors, and people with disabilities.

That is just flat wrong. That is a deception being pulled on the American people to get them to panic about us trying to take corrective action on our massive Federal deficit and set things on a good course for all Americans.

We are making sure that Medicaid stays strong for the people who truly count on it. In my home State of California, for example, Governor Newsom and the State legislature have stretched Medicaid way beyond intention and even sustainability.

In California, it is called Medi-Cal. It had run an additional \$12 billion worth of deficit on the State budget because they want to hand it out to illegal immigrants in our home State. That is the effect on our State budget, \$12 billion in the hole. They wanted to raise taxes to fix that.

Also, by waiving work requirements for able-bodied adults who choose not to work, it drains resources from people who are actually the intended recipients of the program.

With this new law, we are cutting waste, fraud, and red tape so States can zero in on helping people actually qualified, as designed. We are putting billions into long-term care, which means more care at home for people or keeping them close by.

Don't buy the lies. This Medicaid package is going to be helpful long term.

ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS

Mr. LATIMER. Mr. Speaker, today President Trump announced that the U.S. will provide NATO allies with weapons to send to Ukraine. Finally. This is welcome news, but it comes 6 months late.

Wasn't it candidate Trump who promised to end this war on day one? How many Ukrainian lives might have been saved if he had kept that promise?

President Trump also announced that Putin has 50 days to agree to a cease-fire or face "very severe tariffs."

On May 28, the President gave Putin 2 weeks to show a willingness to end the war in Ukraine. That was 6 weeks ago. Now the deadline has been extended. The future of Ukraine and its people hangs in the balance.

Actions speak louder than words. Ukraine has been subjected to tariffs.

Russia has not. It is time this administration stood up to Putin with the same level of rhetoric used to insult Canada and Denmark. We can't afford any more of these deadlines that keep getting pushed and hollow threats. Months ago, we called on this government to side with the victim, Ukraine. Let's back it up with deeds.

EVENTS IN MILWAUKEE

(Mr. GROTHMAN asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend his remarks.)

Mr. GROTHMAN. Mr. Speaker, it is nice to be back in Congress after a little break being home. We look at the news back home, and in Milwaukee we had another tragedy. For the fourth time this year, a city of Milwaukee police officer was shot. This time, sadly, it was fatal. When Officer Kendall Corder was killed, we suffered another savage murder in Milwaukee.

When I was a child, Milwaukee was the safest of the 25 biggest cities in this country. We have gone a long way from that. I hope this House addresses the root causes of why we have so much more crime in our major cities than we did 25 years ago.

Also while I was at home, I ran into somebody who is in a low-income housing unit that receives the low-income housing tax credits. This person was being asked to confirm that they did not get any raise in the last year.

This is a horrible program. It is an embarrassment. The Republicans extended it in the One Big Beautiful Bill Act, and I hope we immediately do something to stop this program, which discourages people from working and improving their lives.

BRIGADIER GENERAL DONALD WAYNE HANSEN CELEBRATES 92ND BIRTHDAY

Mr. SUBRAMANYAM. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor Brigadier General Donald Wayne Hansen, who recently celebrated his 92nd birthday. This milestone marks a lifetime of extraordinary military service and leadership.

General Hansen's nearly three-decade career began commissioning as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army Judge Advocate General's Corps. During the Vietnam war, he served as an assistant staff judge advocate for the 1st Infantry Division, the legendary Big Red One, and later as a staff judge advocate for the U.S. Army Support Command in Saigon.

In 1985, he was appointed assistant judge advocate general of the U.S. Army, capping a distinguished career characterized by integrity, valor, and commitment to military justice.
