MAKE STATE WILDLIFE ACTION PLANS EFFICIENT ACT OF 2025

The SPEAKER pro tempore. MOMENT OF SILENCE HONORING REPRESENTATIVE CAROLYN CHEEKS KILPATRICK

(Mrs. DINGELL asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute.)

Mrs. DINGELL. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor the memory of Representative Carolyn Cheeks Kilpatrick, a devoted public servant to Michigan for decades.

Congresswoman Kilpatrick began her career as a public school teacher in Detroit before being elected to the Michigan House of Representatives, where she became the first Black woman to serve on the powerful appropriations committee.

She would serve nearly 20 years in the State House before being elected to the United States Congress, where she also served on the House Committee on Appropriations. She was chair of the Congressional Black Caucus and cared deeply about mentoring and empowering the next generation of leaders.

Members of the Congressional Black Caucus have joined the bipartisan Michigan delegation to honor her memory tonight.

Over her 14 years in the House, she fought for much-needed Federal funding to revitalize southeast Michigan when it needed it the most.

Her work helped bring Detroit back from the verge of bankruptcy and grow into the flourishing city it is today.

She secured money for education, infrastructure, medical services, and other much-needed investments. Our beautiful, clean riverfront is just one permanent reminder of her impact on our community.

We are thankful for her lifetime of service to our great State.
