Mr. DURBIN. Mr. President, when the Senate considers the reconciliation

bill, H.R. 1, it is my intention to make the following motions to commit to the bill:

- (1) A motion to commit the bill H.R. 1 to the Committee on Armed Services of the Senate with instructions to report the same back to the Senate in 3 days, not counting any day on which the Senate is not in session, with changes that—
- (1) are within the jurisdiction of such committee; and
- (2) restore funding for the Congressionally Directed Medical Research Program of the Department of Defense to an amount equal to not less than five percent real growth annually over the fiscal year 2024 level through fiscal year 2029.
- (2) A motion to commit the bill H.R. 1 to the Committee on Armed Services of the Senate with instructions to report the same back to the Senate in 3 days, not counting any day on which the Senate is not in session, with changes that—
- (1) are within the jurisdiction of such committee; and
- (2) insert after section 20011 a new section appropriating not less than \$300,000,000 for the Ukraine Security Assistance Initiative by using cost savings associated with a prohibition on the procurement, modification, restoration, or maintenance of an aircraft previously owned by a foreign government, an entity controlled by a foreign government, or a representative of a foreign government for the purposes of providing presidential airlift options.
- (3) A motion to commit the bill H.R. 1 to the Committee on Finance of the Senate with instructions to report the same back to the Senate in 3 days, not counting any day on which the Senate is not in session, with changes that—
- (1) are within the jurisdiction of such committee; and
