Mr. HAGERTY. Mr. President, I rise today to urge my colleagues to support the confirmation of my close friend and, for the past 4 years, my chief of staff, Mr. Adam Telle, who is President Trump's nominee to serve as Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works. He has served as my chief of staff for the past 4 years, and in that time, he has become a trusted adviser, a leader on my team, and, frankly, a very good friend.

Adam has spent the past two decades serving on both ends of Pennsylvania Avenue and at all times serving this body here in the U.S. Senate, whether he was leading the Senate side of the leg affairs team at the White House or working right here for many of us.
