

AMRAAM control sections; containers and support equipment; munitions support and support equipment; spare parts, consumables, accessories, and repair and return support; weapons software and support equipment; classified software delivery and support; transportation support; classified publications and technical documentation; studies and surveys; U.S. Government and contractor engineering, technical, and logistics support services; and other related elements of logistics and program support. The estimated total cost was \$215.5 million. Major Defense Equipment (MDE) constituted \$190.6 million of this total.

This transmittal notifies an increase in MDE value by \$125.6 million, and non-MDE value by \$16.5 million due to recent cost increases. There are no additional MDE or non-MDE items being reported with this notification. The estimated total case value will increase by \$142.1 million to a revised \$357.6 million. MDE will constitute \$316.2 million of this total.

(iv) Significance: This notification is being provided due to recent cost increases that have brought about the need to add value to the original notification. The proposed value increase will further advance the already high level of Danish Air Force interoperability with U.S. Joint Forces and other regional and NATO forces.

(v) Justification: This proposed sale will support the foreign policy and national security objectives of the United States by improving the security of a NATO Ally that is a force for political stability and economic progress in Europe.

(vi) Sensitivity of Technology:

The Sensitivity of Technology Statement contained in the original notification applies to items reported here.

The highest level of classification of defense articles, components, and services included in this potential sale is SECRET.

(vii) Date Report Delivered to Congress: December 15, 2025.

ARMS SALES NOTIFICATION

Mr. RISCH. Mr. President, section 36(b) of the Arms Export Control Act requires that Congress receive prior notification of certain proposed arms sales as defined by that statute. Upon such notification, the Congress has 30 calendar days during which the sale may be reviewed. The provision stipulates that, in the Senate, the notification of proposed sales shall be sent to the chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

In keeping with the committee's intention to see that relevant information is still available to the full Senate, I ask unanimous consent to have printed in the RECORD the notifications that have been received. If the cover letter references a classified annex, then such an annex is available to all Senators in the office of the Foreign Relations Committee, room SD-423.

Report of Enhancement or Upgrade of Sensitivity of Technology or Capability (Sec. 36(b)(5)(C), AECA)

(i) Prospective Purchaser: Government of Italy.

(ii) Sec. 36(b)(1), AECA Transmittal No.: 21-07; Date: December 15, 2020; Implementing Agency: Air Force.

(iii) Description: On December 15, 2020, Congress was notified by congressional certification transmittal number 21-07 of the possible sale, under Section 36(b)(1) of the Arms Export Control Act, of four (4) Multifunctional Information Distribution Systems—Joint Tactical Radio System (MIDS JTRS) (2 installed, 2 spares); three (3) Embedded/GPS/INS (EGI) with GPS security devices, airborne (2 installed, 1 spare); and four (4) RIO™ Communications Intelligence Systems (2 installed, 2 spares). The following non-MDE items were also included: Missile Warning Sensors; AN/ALE-47 Countermeasure Dispenser Sets (CMOS); MX-20HD Electro-Optical and Infra-Red systems; Osprey 50 AESA Radars; AISREW ISR equipment; Secure Communications equipment; Identification Friend or Foe Systems; aircraft modification and integration; ground systems for data processing and crew training; ground support equipment; publications and technical data; U.S. Government and contractor engineering, technical, and logistics support services; flight test and certification; and other related elements of logistical and program support. The estimated total cost was \$500 million. Major De-

fense Equipment (MDE) constituted \$10 million of this total.

This transmittal notifies the inclusion of the following additional MDE items: one (1) Embedded/GPS/INS (EGI) with GPS security device; and one (1) Communications Intelligence (COMINT) Systems Sensor Suite. The following non-MDE items are also included: aircraft components, parts, and accessories; transportation support; and other related elements of logistics and program support. The estimated total cost of the new items is \$220 million. The estimated MDE value will increase by \$3 million to a revised \$13 million. The estimated non-MDE value will increase by \$217 million to a revised \$707 million. The estimated total case value will increase by \$220 million to a revised \$720 million.

(iv) Significance: This notification is being provided because the MDE and non-MDE items were not enumerated in the original notification. The inclusion of this MDE represents an increase in capability over what was previously notified. The proposed sale supports and complements the ongoing efforts of Italy to modernize its airborne Intelligence, Surveillance, Reconnaissance, and Electronic Warfare capability and increases interoperability between the U.S. Air Force and the Italian Air Force (ITAF).

(v) Justification: This proposed sale will support the foreign policy and national security objectives of the United States by improving the security of a NATO Ally that is a force for political stability and economic progress in Europe.

(vi) Sensitivity of Technology:

TRIBUTE TO MATTHEW P. GOODMAN

Mr. SULLIVAN. Mr. President, I rise today to honor Matthew P. Goodman as he retires from his leadership position at the Council on Foreign Relations, marking the conclusion of an exceptional career spanning more than three decades of service to America's economic security and international leadership and to the American people.

Mr. Goodman's dedication to our Nation's interests in the global economy has been unwavering. Throughout his career, he has served with distinction in multiple Presidential administrations, led groundbreaking research, and shaped the debates that define how our country engages with and in the international economy.

Mr. Goodman's exemplary commitment to public service has been in the best tradition of bipartisan service to our Nation. His government service began at the U.S. Treasury Department during President Reagan's second term, where he served as an international economist, including 5 distinguished years as financial attache at the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo, representing American interests during a transformative period in U.S.-Japan economic relations and the broader Asia-Pacific economy. He is being honored by the Government of Japan for his lifelong support for our alliance.

Mr. Goodman served as senior adviser to the Undersecretary for Economic Affairs at the U.S. Department of State, where he contributed to the Quadrennial Diplomacy and Development Review. From 2002 to 2004 under President George W. Bush, he served as Director for Asian Economic Affairs on the National Security Council staff during a pivotal period in U.S.-Asia relations, during which we worked together closely.

During the Obama administration he served as Director for International Economics on the National Security Council staff from 2010 to 2012, where he played a crucial role in helping the President navigate complex global economic challenges. As White House Coordinator for the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation, APEC, forum and the East Asia Summit during America's APEC host year, he oversaw U.S. policy development in these critical forums and helped organize major international summits including the G-20 and East Asia Summit.

Mr. Goodman has been equally influential in shaping economic policy through his intellectual leadership. Most recently, he served as distinguished fellow and Director of the Greenberg Center for Geoeconomic Studies at the Council on Foreign Relations, where he launched and led the RealEcon initiative: Reimagining American Economic Leadership. Critically, with the RealEcon initiative Mr. Goodman sought not to take Washington wisdom to the American people, but rather to spend time with the American people, traveling across our Nation, meeting with Americans from all walks of life, listening to their concerns and hearing their ideas, so that he could take their wisdom back to Washington.

Through his leadership of the RealEcon initiative at CFR, Mr. Goodman tackled one of the most pressing challenges of our time: building a sustainable domestic consensus for American international economic engagement.

Before joining CFR in 2023, Mr. Goodman spent over a decade at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, CSIS, serving as senior vice president for economics and holder of the prestigious William E. Simon Chair in political economy. During his tenure at CSIS from 2012 to 2023, he established and directed important work on global economic policy with particular expertise on the dynamic Asia-Pacific region, testifying before Congress on numerous occasions and advising policymakers on critical economic and trade issues. Like many of my colleagues, I have been the beneficiary of his insight and advice.

His private sector experience, including 5 years as head of Goldman Sachs's government affairs operations in Tokyo and London, gave him invaluable insights into how policy intersects with commerce and the private sector.

Mr. Goodman's analytical rigor rests on a strong academic foundation. He

earned his master of arts in international relations from the Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies, one of the Nation's premier institutions for training foreign policy professionals, and his bachelor of science in economics from the prestigious London School of Economics.

Behind every accomplished public servant stands a supportive family, and Mr. Goodman's achievements have been made possible by the unwavering love and partnership of his wife Patty Goodman. Together, they have built a warm home in the Washington area and raised two accomplished sons—Misha and Will—while navigating the demands and long hours of public service.

The Goodman household has also been a place of multigenerational care and connection. When Patty's father John needed support, they welcomed him into their home with love and dedication. Matthew's own father Ray Goodman, born in London in 1916, lived to celebrate his centennial birthday, a testament to the resilience and longevity that runs in the family and a living connection to a century of global history and the "special relationship" between the United States and the United Kingdom. Countless Washingtonians were also blessed to have Matthew's mother Dorothy in their lives as the founder of the Washington International School and a fierce advocate for education reform.

Those who know Matthew Goodman recognize not just his policy expertise, but his remarkable sense of humor, his ability to maintain perspective during challenging times, and his gift for bringing people together. His annual family poems—shared with friends and family during the holidays—reveal a man who can find light even in dark times, who values literature and wit alongside economic data and policy analysis, and who never lost sight of what matters most even while serving at the highest levels of government and policy making.

Mr. Goodman's contributions to American economic statecraft have been important and lasting. He has been at the table for critical decisions affecting trade policy, international economic institutions, supply chain security, and America's engagement with the Asia-Pacific region. His work on economic security, geoeconomics, and the intersection of economics and foreign policy has influenced a generation of policymakers and scholars. An important part of his legacy are the hundreds of interns, associates, and staff who benefited from his training, support, and encouragement. Many have followed his example in service to the country in roles across the government.

As Mr. Goodman retires from CFR and this chapter of extraordinary public service comes to a close, he leaves behind a legacy of rigorous analysis, principled leadership, and dedicated

service to the American people. His work has made our Nation more secure, more prosperous, and better positioned to navigate the complex challenges of the global economy.

On behalf of a grateful Nation, I congratulate Matthew P. Goodman on a distinguished career and wish him, Patty, Misha, and Will health, happiness, and well-deserved time together in the years ahead. I know that his retirement will be filled with the same humor, grace, and intellectual curiosity that have characterized his remarkable career. We will all continue to look to him for his thought leadership and wise counsel.

I ask my colleagues to join me in thanking Matthew P. Goodman for his decades of exceptional service to the United States of America.

TRIBUTE TO CHARLES KELLEY

Mr. REED. Mr. President, I rise today to congratulate Charles "Charlie" Kelley, executive director of the Rhode Island Student Loan Authority, RISLA, on his upcoming retirement and to thank him for his 34 years of service to students, families, and educators across Rhode Island and the U.S.

Throughout his career, Charlie's north star has been ensuring that students and families have affordable, safe options to finance postsecondary education. Charlie joined RISLA in 1991 as deputy director and quickly advanced to become executive director. He has guided RISLA through the changing and complex landscape of student lending. He expanded RISLA's services to include financial support for student internship programs, employer-based student loan repayment programs, and targeted loan forgiveness programs to meet critical workforce needs in Rhode Island.

Charlie was the driving force behind RISLA's College Planning Center, which has become Rhode Island's leading college planning agency. For the past two decades, the College Planning Center has provided free guidance to students and families navigating complicated and unfamiliar financial decisions. It has helped students file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, FAFSA, understand their financial aid award letters, and select the college that is right for them. I know firsthand how effective the College Planning Center is because it has helped me and my family.

Another innovation Charlie helped establish is Financial Aid Nights, which we host together each year to give college-bound students and families the chance to learn firsthand from financial aid experts and connect with resources to help them plan for and finance college.

Charlie's impact goes beyond Rhode Island, as his influence can be seen throughout the Federal student aid community. He brought his expertise and advocacy for college affordability to the national level, where he served
