Each of these men served the people of Clay County with courage, integrity, and a deep sense of duty. Each answered the same call that law enforcement officers across America answer every day—a call to stand between danger and the community they serve. They knew the risks of the badge, and they accepted them anyway.

Behind every one of these names is a story of service. Long shifts. Missed holidays. Quiet acts of courage that most people never see—a commitment to protect their neighbors and uphold the law even when it demanded the ultimate sacrifice. Their legacy continues today through the deputies and officers who still serve Clay County with honor.

On May 7, 2026, the Clay County Sheriffs Office gathered to remember these heroes who gave their lives in the line of duty. Their

Since 1876, the Munselle family has farmed the Alexander Valley in North Sonoma County, California. Over six generations, they grew high quality crops in our community's rich soil and ideal climate. The family's first ventures were in wine under the labels Lone Pine Cellars and Red Winery. Over time they expanded their business into other crops and

livestock. These included grapes, hops, prunes, and dairy cattle. In 1972, the family returned to their roots and began growing wine grapes again. For the last five decades, the Munselle family has focused on producing premium wine grapes, which have in turn been made into many award-winning wines by wineries throughout our Sonoma County community.

In 2006, Bret and Kristen Munselle partnered with Bret's parents, Bill and Reta Munselle, to launch the limited-production wine label, Munselle Vineyards. Today, Munselle Vineyards produces up to 1,000 cases of hand-crafted wine annually which are enjoyed by their customers throughout the seasons.

In addition to the family's personal achievements, they are helping pioneer the future of farming in our community. Munselle Vineyards is a pilot farm in the Sonoma County Winegrowers' Farm of the Future initiative, an initiative connecting local farmers with cutting-edge agriculture technologies from John Deere, Agrology, and Wilbur-Ellis. Munselle Vineyards is a living laboratory for next-generation agriculture and is pioneering farming practices that enhance sustainability, efficiency, and long-term viability of family farms. In addition to this innovative spirit, the Munselle family are leaders beyond their own vineyards. They have stepped up as officers for both the Alexander Valley American Viticulture Area and Sonoma County Winegrowers, helping to shape the future of wine growing in our region.

Mr. Speaker, I thank Munselle Vineyards and the Munselle family for their contributions to our community. Therefore, it is fitting and proper that we honor them here today.

Chief Vaughn's steadfast leadership has extended well beyond the confines of a hangar. He has successfully coordinated complex operations, displaying Coast Guard capabilities for three consecutive National Cherry festival

airshows while strengthening partnerships and enhancing public trust.

Additionally, his contributions to the testing and implementation of the ATLAS emergency rescue device have helped improve safety for Coast Guard aircrews across the Northern Michigan Fleet. Equally commendable is Chief Vaughn's commitment to service beyond the uniform. He has dedicated more than 1,000 volunteer hours to the Grand Traverse community, supporting veterans, local organizations, and families in need. From organizing food pantries and community projects to serving as an Honor Flight guardian, his efforts earned him the Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal.

HONORING JOSEPH C. THOMAS, SR.

Mr. THOMPSON of Mississippi. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to recognize and honor the life, service, and extraordinary achievements of Senator Joseph C. Thomas, Sr., a trailblazer, public servant, and devoted family man whose legacy has left an indelible mark on the State of Mississippi and beyond.

Born on June 25, 1949, Senator Thomas has dedicated his life to breaking barriers and opening doors for others. He is married to Elizabeth Wilburn, and together they have raised three children—Joe Thomas, Jr., Kirk Thomas, and Whitney L. Thomas—and are blessed with grandchildren who continue his proud legacy.

Senator Thomas' professional journey is one defined by courage, excellence, and historic accomplishment. He became the first African American hired to work at a bank in Yazoo City, Mississippi, marking the beginning of a distinguished career in banking and finance. On May 1, 1972, he made history again as the first African American hired at Delta National Bank. His leadership and dedication led to a series of groundbreaking achievements: he became the first African American Loan Officer in the State of Mississippi, the first African American Assistant Vice President at Delta National Bank, and later the first African American Vice President at Deposit Guaranty National Bank. After 30 years of exemplary service, he retired from an institution now known as Regions Bank.

Beyond his professional accomplishments, Senator Thomas has been a pioneer in education and public service. He was the first African American to serve as President of the Yazoo City Municipal School District and the first from Yazoo County to serve on the State School Board Association. His leadership extended into regulatory and civic roles, where he became the first African American Vice-President of the Mississippi Real Estate Appraisal Board and served as Vice Chairman of the Public Service Commission in Yazoo City.

His influence reached the national stage as well, serving as the first African American from his community on the National Board of Directors of the American Public Power Association
