Ms. McCOLLUM. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor Nina Ozlu Tunceli on the occasion of her retirement. For more than three decades, Nina has been one of the most tireless and effective advocates for the arts in America. Nina understands something fundamental: not only do the arts enrich our lives, they are also a key component of vibrant, economically strong communities.

Since 1993, Nina has served as Chief Counsel of Government and Public Affairs at Americans for the Arts, and since 2004, as the founding Executive Director of the Americans for the Arts Action Fund. In that time, she built a network of 450,000 grassroots activists, built relationships with members of Congress on both sides of the aisle, and made the case that support for the arts is not a partisan issue—it is an American one.

Nina has helped secure some of the most consequential arts policy wins of the past thirty years. In 2009, she led the "Arts = Jobs" campaign, which secured \$50 million in federal support for the arts in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. During the pandemic, she helped secure critical relief for artists and arts organizations through the CARES Act, the Economic Aid Act, and the American Rescue Plan. Then, Nina established Zoom Office Hours with Nina where she devoted time to personally walking artists and small arts organizations through how to access that essential aid. She built the National Arts Advocacy Day into a Capitol Hill institution. Through ArtsVote, Nina ensured that voters across the country understood what was at stake for the arts in every election.

I had the privilege of working with Nina throughout my time in Congress, especially during my leadership of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies. Nina has been a constant, trusted partner in the subcommittee's work to fund the National Endowment for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Humanities. Nina provided the subcommittee with data and brought with her the voices of artists and arts organizations from every corner of the country. That partnership made our subcommittee's work stronger, and it strengthened the case for federal arts funding.

Mr. Speaker, a career like Nina's isn't just measured in legislation passed or funding secured. It's measured in the local arts agencies

still standing, the artists who kept working through moments of crisis, and the generation of advocates she trained and inspired along the way.

On behalf of everyone who has ever benefited from a stronger, more visible case for the arts in this country, I want to thank Nina Ozlu Tunceli for 30 years of extraordinary service. I wish her the very best in her retirement.

RECOGNIZING CATHERINE A. MINNIS

Ms. WILSON of Florida. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to recognize and pay tribute to Catherine A. Minnis, a strong and well-known advocate for breast cancer awareness in South Florida.

In 2006, Ms. Minnis overcame a cancer scare when a lump found by her doctor turned out to be benign. That same year, a former boss died from breast cancer. Shortly thereafter, Ms. Minnis joined the Dade-Monroe Unit of The American Cancer Society and was named Volunteer of the Year for her activism in the fight against breast cancer and for raising nearly 400,000 dollars for cancer research. A coffee-table book with stories from breast cancer survivors written by Ms. Minnis to empower, educate and encourage women with breast cancer and breast cancer survivors, will be released in November of 2012.

Experts estimate that about one out of every eight women born today will be diagnosed with breast cancer at some time during her life. The strongest risk factor for breast cancer is age. A woman's risk of developing this disease increases as she gets older. However, thanks to the work Ms. Minnis is doing and improvements in cancer treatment and early detection, millions of women and thousands of men are surviving breast cancer today.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women in the United States, other than skin cancer. It is the second leading cause of cancer death in women, after lung cancer. The disease occurs almost entirely in women, but men can get it, too. Today, there are more than 2.9 million breast cancer survivors in the United States.

I am honored to recognize Catherine A. Minnis, a long-term advocate for breast cancer awareness, for her dedication and commitment to our community and the fight against breast cancer.

We were married for 65 years and loved it all." Maine is better off thanks to the tireless advocacy and bountiful love of Sandy and Ole.

We are so grateful for their activism and the compassionate and giving lives they led in our state. I extend my deepest condolences to their family, including their children, Eric, Carl, Joseph, and Anna Sofia.
