

He held his bachelor's and master's degrees from Albany State University, and he would go on to earn his doctorate from Valdosta State.

Dr. Parker took him under his wing. And Dr. Griswold rose—department chairman, dean of academic affairs, vice president for academic affairs, executive vice president—every rung of it, at the same institution, for 18 years.

When the college lost its president without warning, Albany Tech did not have to look outside for somebody to carry it. He was already there. On November 1, 2022, Dr. Emmett L. Griswold became the sixth president of Albany Technical College, standing on the foundation laid by his mentor and his friend.

Mr. Speaker, that is what 65 years of an institution actually looks like. Not a building. Not a seal. A man who taught, mentored, and believed in another man—who then took up the same work and kept the doors open for the next one.

Those doors, Mr. Speaker, have never asked a single student what their father did for a living. They have opened for the single mother working nights. For the man laid off at 45 who had to start over. For the young person nobody expected anything from, who is today a lineman, a nurse, a welder, a diesel technician, a logistics specialist—who owns a home, pays taxes, and raises children who will never know what it was to go without.

That is the harvest of 65 years in Southwest Georgia.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I ask my colleagues to join me in congratulating Albany Technical College on sixty-five years of service, in commending President Emmett L. Griswold, his faculty, his staff, and his Board of Directors, in honoring the memory of Dr. Anthony O. Parker and all who led before him, and in wishing this great institution many more years of transforming lives across Southwest Georgia.

I believe America's strength comes from our nation's ability to grow and move forward with the engagement and attention of the citizens. To realize America's strength, the citizens must be well informed and educated. Those citizens create communities that generate trust between their neighbors to influence policy. When those communities unite, America has a system in place to change the fate of our governmental system for the better. This system can create long lasting change in America, improving the country for future generations.

In order for America to grow and move forward, the public must be well informed and well educated. Everyone that has the right to vote should have access to education. Education creates a solid base of knowledge and skills necessary to promote individual civic responsibility. Civic responsibility is

important because it leads to engagement with our country, necessary for a strong democracy and nation. Without the ability to read the ballot, how can we expect anyone to be engaged with democratic process? Next, having a well informed public that knows what is going on in the nation is very important. It's not enough that citizens can read, it is that they do read, and learn about issues in their government that they care about. With robust information, a well informed public enlivens democracy to grow and move forward, because people can make better decisions about what is happening in their country. To have a well informed public, reliable sources of information must be available. Secondly, America derives strength from the trust built through engaged communities. When citizens are engaged with the issues that are affecting their community they can unite and come together to improve. When a community solves a problem they build trust by talking to each other and working together to fix the problem. People get involved in their community by joining events, talking to neighbors and joining clubs in their community. Anything that requires multiple people to interact in a community creates familiarity and trust. The government especially requires familiarity and trust from its constituents. As people work with each other to address issues in their community, those same people grow to become influential parts of the government. Whether they submit public comments, letters to their representatives or running for local office, these people exert influence on governance that leads to improvement. This process of well-informed, and educated citizens engaging with the issues of their community keeps growing until a chain of trust bonds every person. An example of this is the 19th amendment that gave women the right to vote. Over the span of about 70 years, the idea of women's suffrage spread grew from novel, to good, to great, until finally being ratified in 1920. In other forms of government, like the British monarchy from which the USA revolted, citizens' ideas take a back seat to what the leader wants. But in this nation we have created a system where things can change and be better.

Overall, America's strength comes from a public being well informed. That public must belong to communities that create trust and generate great ideas. Those great ideas then inform the governmental system that adapts to become better. To make America stronger, citizens must obtain good education, keep themselves well informed, build community to discuss and debate how America can improve, and engage in the political process to see their ideas come into law. HONORING EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH

Mr. FIELDS. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to acknowledge Ebenezer Baptist Church of South Baton Rouge, Louisiana, a congregation whose beginnings date back to November 12, 1926, when a group of devout Christians met at the home of Sister Louvenia Green to establish a place of worship. The late Reverend Johnny Banks, one of the organizers, was elected as the church's first pastor. Ebenezer Baptist Church was formally incorporated on July 30, 1931, and Reverend Banks served faithfully until his passing in 1960. Leadership continued under Reverend Johnny Cyrus, who served until his death in that same year, followed briefly by Reverend Joseph Martin, assistant pastor, until the election of Reverend John H. Thomas, II, who guided the church forward until July 1971.

In August 1971, Reverend Q.T. Ellis was elected pastor, with Reverend Lemmie Washington serving as assistant pastor. Following Reverend Washington's death, Reverend Alex Banks assumed the role of assistant pastor. Under Reverend Ellis's leadership, the church progressed spiritually and structurally. In 1985, a major addition was completed including a pastor's study, secretary's office, dressing rooms, restrooms, a dining and kitchen facility, and expanded parking. After Reverend Ellis's resignation in May 1988, Reverend Banks served briefly as interim pastor until Reverend Ellis was re-elected in March 1989. Weekly Bible study was instituted as a core part of Ebenezer's spiritual development. Reverend Banks later became pastor of Christ Land Baptist Church, and Reverend William Armstead was elected assistant pastor.

On May 7, 2000, Reverend Q.T. Ellis became Pastor Emeritus, and Reverend Ronald A. Sutton was elected pastor. Under Reverend Sutton's leadership, the church developed its motto, mission, and vision statement, and the membership increased through Baptism and Christian Experience. In 2002, the church's name was changed to Ebenezer Baptist Church of South Baton Rouge. Reverend Sutton proposed remodeling the sanctuary, and construction began in January 2004, resulting in a new sanctuary, pews, organ, electronic piano, updated sound system, and additional parking. During construction, Greater Mt. Gideon Baptist Church and Greater Pleasant Green Baptist Church graciously opened their doors for worship and Bible study. By June 12, 2004, Ebenezer returned to its newly renovated home. In subsequent years, properties were purchased and improved along Carolina Street and Missouri Street as part of continued campus development.

Mr. Speaker, Ebenezer Baptist Church of South Baton Rouge continues to stand as a pillar of service, faith, and community engagement. In January 2025, the church implemented its 'Community Conversation' series addressing gun violence, education, domestic violence, voting, and economic development. In April and May 2025, Ebenezer hosted COPE training to strengthen community empathy and engagement. In January 2026, the church hosted a three-month Community

Trauma Awareness Summit addressing mental health, stress, anxiety, depression, and suicide. On November 15, 2026, Ebenezer Baptist Church will celebrate its 100th Centennial Anniversary—giving honor to God for the abundant spiritual and financial blessings bestowed upon the congregation. I ask my colleagues to join me in recognizing Ebenezer Baptist Church of South Baton Rouge for a century of faith, resilience, and devotion to carrying out the purpose of the Church as the light of the world and the salt of the earth.
