Mr. FIELDS. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to acknowledge Ebenezer Baptist Church of South Baton Rouge, Louisiana, a congregation whose beginnings date back to November 12, 1926, when a group of devout Christians met at the home of Sister Louvenia Green to establish a place of worship. The late Reverend Johnny Banks, one of the organizers, was elected as the church's first pastor. Ebenezer Baptist Church was formally incorporated on July 30, 1931, and Reverend Banks served faithfully until his passing in 1960. Leadership continued under Reverend Johnny Cyrus, who served until his death in that same year, followed briefly by Reverend Joseph Martin, assistant pastor, until the election of Reverend John H. Thomas, II, who guided the church forward until July 1971.

In August 1971, Reverend Q.T. Ellis was elected pastor, with Reverend Lemmie Washington serving as assistant pastor. Following Reverend Washington's death, Reverend Alex Banks assumed the role of assistant pastor. Under Reverend Ellis's leadership, the church progressed spiritually and structurally. In 1985, a major addition was completed including a pastor's study, secretary's office, dressing rooms, restrooms, a dining and kitchen facility, and expanded parking. After Reverend Ellis's resignation in May 1988, Reverend Banks served briefly as interim pastor until Reverend Ellis was re-elected in March 1989. Weekly Bible study was instituted as a core part of Ebenezer's spiritual development. Reverend Banks later became pastor of Christ Land Baptist Church, and Reverend William Armstead was elected assistant pastor.

On May 7, 2000, Reverend Q.T. Ellis became Pastor Emeritus, and Reverend Ronald A. Sutton was elected pastor. Under Reverend Sutton's leadership, the church developed its motto, mission, and vision statement, and the membership increased through Baptism and Christian Experience. In 2002, the church's name was changed to Ebenezer Baptist Church of South Baton Rouge. Reverend Sutton proposed remodeling the sanctuary, and construction began in January 2004, resulting in a new sanctuary, pews, organ, electronic piano, updated sound system, and additional parking. During construction, Greater Mt. Gideon Baptist Church and Greater Pleasant Green Baptist Church graciously opened their doors for worship and Bible study. By June 12, 2004, Ebenezer returned to its newly renovated home. In subsequent years, properties were purchased and improved along Carolina Street and Missouri Street as part of continued campus development.

Mr. Speaker, Ebenezer Baptist Church of South Baton Rouge continues to stand as a pillar of service, faith, and community engagement. In January 2025, the church implemented its 'Community Conversation' series addressing gun violence, education, domestic violence, voting, and economic development. In April and May 2025, Ebenezer hosted COPE training to strengthen community empathy and engagement. In January 2026, the church hosted a three-month Community

Trauma Awareness Summit addressing mental health, stress, anxiety, depression, and suicide. On November 15, 2026, Ebenezer Baptist Church will celebrate its 100th Centennial Anniversary—giving honor to God for the abundant spiritual and financial blessings bestowed upon the congregation. I ask my colleagues to join me in recognizing Ebenezer Baptist Church of South Baton Rouge for a century of faith, resilience, and devotion to carrying out the purpose of the Church as the light of the world and the salt of the earth.

Father Jimmy's time as a priest has seen him take multiple roles throughout the archdiocese. He has served as pastor of St. Paul Catholic Church, St. Joseph Catholic Church—Honey Creek, and St. Margaret Mary Catholic Church. He has also held administrative roles across the archdiocese. He serves as the Spiritual Director for the First Responder focused Shields of Christ ACTS Teams and was the Chaplain to former San Antonio Police Chief William McManus.

Father Jimmy has also dedicated himself to serving the San Antonio community. He is a Board Member for Project Quest, a workforce development organization. For over thirty years, he has been a trusted leader with the COPS-Metro Alliance. He is also an outspoken advocate for the immigrant communities.

Mr. Speaker, please join me in celebration of a pastoral career dedicated to serving one's community. For over thirty years, Father Jimmy has been a source of hope and inspiration to many, and I am grateful for all he has done for our San Antonio community.

Mr. BOST. Mr. Speaker, I rise today along with my fellow House co-chairs—Representative FITZPATRICK, Representative HOYER, Representative LARSON—and the entire Congressional Fire Services Caucus to recognize the 25th anniversary of September 11, 2001.

On that tragic morning, nearly 3,000 innocent lives—including 343 members of the fire and emergency services—were taken in acts of terrorism that shook our country to its core. As co-chairs of the Congressional Fire Services Caucus, we stand today, 25 years later, to remember every individual loss, every family forever changed by unimaginable tragedy, and every community that continues to carry the weight of that day.

As we reflect on the events of September 11th, we pay special tribute to America's first responders. In a time of fear, confusion, and turmoil, members of the fire and emergency

services rushed toward danger with unwavering resolve. They did not hesitate. They answered the call knowing the risks, guided by a profound commitment to protecting lives.

On 9/11, hundreds of firefighters and EMS providers made the ultimate sacrifice while carrying out their duty. Their courage became a defining symbol of American heroism, reminding us that the measure of service is found not in words, but in selfless action. The courage displayed by these first responders inspired millions and reminded us that hope is strongest when we stand together. In those moments of profound uncertainty, neighbors helped neighbors, communities rallied together, and Americans from every walk of life stood united in compassion and resilience.

We also honor the thousands of first responders who labored tirelessly in the days, weeks, and months that followed. Amid smoke, debris, and uncertainty, they searched for survivors, recovered the fallen, comforted grieving families, and helped a wounded Nation begin the long process of healing. Many have since faced life-threatening illnesses and chronic health conditions resulting from their service. Their sacrifices did not end when the recovery efforts concluded, and our Nation's obligation to care for them remains as enduring as their commitment to us.

In the years since September 11th, that obligation has taken many forms. The Congressional Fire Services Caucus has worked to ensure that the needs of America's first responders remain a priority in Washington, D.C.—advocating for the resources, protections, benefits, and support they need to serve their communities and return home safely. The work of the Fire Services Caucus reflects a responsibility that extends far beyond any single anniversary: to understand the needs and challenges of our local fire and EMS personnel, to stand with those who stand ready to protect us, and to ensure that our Nation does not forget the sacrifices made every day in service to others.

Across our cities, towns, and rural communities, first responders answer emergency calls regardless of what awaits them at the scene. They respond to fires, medical emergencies, hazardous material incidents, natural disasters, and much more with the same dedication and sense of duty that defined those who responded on September 11th. The work of the fire and emergency services is indispensable to the safety and well-being of every American.

To the younger generations who know September 11th only through history, we must preserve not only the memory of that day, but also the guiding example set by those who responded. The legacy of September 11th is one of courage over fear, service over self, and unity over division.

Today, we honor the individuals whose lives were cut short, the families who continue to bear their loss, and the first responders whose bravely became a lasting testament to the best of America. May we never forget their sacrifice. May we continue to support those who wear the uniform of the fire and emergency services. And may we strive each day to keep building a Nation worthy of the courage they displayed on one of our country's darkest days.

She founded Books2Border, a youth-led literacy initiative that has distributed more than 5,500 books and 20 laptops, established five community libraries, rebuilt school libraries in Reynosa, Tamaulipas, Mexico, and expanded educational opportunities for more than 2,500 students in Mexico.

Overall, Miss Humphreys has also completed more than 1,300 documented hours of community service. Through DHR Health's LASER program, she is researching childhood obesity and Type II diabetes risk in the Rio Grande Valley, has been selected to present her work internationally, and has helped educate more than 2,500 students about stroke recognition.

South Texas is home to countless young people with big dreams and a desire to make a difference. Miss Humphreys is a fine example of that promise, reflecting the hard work, compassion, and spirit of service that define our communities.
