Mr. LOUDERMILK. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to recognize the Kiwanis Club of Marietta and its 9/11 Field of Flags Memorial at Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park, as our Nation marks the 25th anniversary of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001.

First organized by the Kiwanis Club of Marietta in 2002, the Field of Flags has become a solemn tradition of remembrance in our community. This year marks the sixth installation of the memorial, with 2,977 American flags placed on the grounds of Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park, each representing an individual life lost on September 11, 2001.

The memorial is made possible through the efforts of members of the community who gather to carry and place the flags. On September 11, 2026, the Kiwanis Club will hold its 25th Anniversary Memorial Service, during which the names of all 2,977 victims will be read aloud. The flags will remain on display through September 19 as a continuing tribute to those whose lives were taken.

For more than two decades, the Field of Flags has brought the Marietta community together to reflect upon the values of service, sacrifice, and unity. This tradition seeks to ensure that younger generations understand the significance of September 11, 2001 and remember the men, women, and children who were lost, as well as the courage demonstrated by first responders, servicemembers, and private citizens throughout our Nation.

Chartered in 1930, the Kiwanis Club of Marietta has a longstanding tradition of service to children, families, and the broader community. I commend its members, volunteers, community partners, and all those whose continued support has sustained the Field of Flags and preserved this important tradition of remembrance.

In further recognition of this solemn anniversary, an American flag was flown over the United States Capitol on September 11, 2026, at my request, in honor of the 2,977 lives lost on September 11, 2001, and in recognition of the Kiwanis Club of Marietta's 9/11 Field of Flags Memorial at Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park.

HONORING NAZARENE BAPTIST CHURCH

Mr. FIELDS. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to acknowledge Nazarene Baptist Church of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, a congregation whose origins date back to 1888 when a small group of Christians organized what would become a pillar of faith within the community. For its first five years, the congregation met in a cottage on Stone Street and then in Pete's Alley before relocating to an area known as 'The Lake,' where the first building was constructed out of crude materials. The church, then called 'Need More,' elected Reverend Horace Williams as its first pastor. Reverend Williams served faithfully until his passing on February 14, 1913. He was succeeded by Reverend W.H. Hall, under whose leadership the church purchased land at North 17th Street and Boyd Avenue and erected a small red building. In November 1915, Nazarene filed its charter with an appointed Board of Trustees.

In 1921, upon Reverend Hall's resignation, Nazarene elected its third pastor, Reverend C.J. Smith. During his pastorate, the church constructed a modern frame building and organized its first choir. After Reverend Smith's death in 1928, Reverend Sam Lundy ministered to the congregation until a new pastor was chosen. In 1930, Reverend F.K. Alpine became Nazarene's fifth pastor. Over four years of leadership, he organized the first Usher Board and led a spirited revival during which he baptized 135 believers in 1933. On November 28, 1934, Reverend T.R. Provost was elected as the sixth pastor. During his nineteen years of leadership, he oversaw construction of a modern edifice, organized a gospel chorus and youth choir, and purchased the church's parsonage. Reverend Provost resigned in 1953 to accept a pastorate in Detroit, and Reverend William Polk served as interim pastor until 1954.

On September 9, 1954, Nazarene elected Reverend George R. Clark as its seventh pastor. Under his 51 years of leadership, the church thrived spiritually and numerically. Reverend Clark organized multiple choirs, formed

new usher boards, combined the Senior Choir and Gospel Chorus into the now-iconic Mass Choir, and modernized church facilities. He also oversaw construction of a two-story annex and expansion of parking facilities. On September 7, 1991, a devastating fire destroyed the church building. Undeterred, the congregation rebuilt, and on January 23, 1994, a new sanctuary and educational complex were dedicated. A Cornerstone Ceremony followed on April 27, 1997. After Reverend Clark's passing in May 1996, Nazarene elected Dr. Albert Green, Jr. as its eighth pastor in December 1997. Dr. Green strengthened the congregation through teaching, preaching, and administrative leadership, revived the tutorial program, reestablished new member education, formed a liturgical dance team and Women's Chorus, and expanded church outreach. Dr. Green served faithfully until his passing on June 30, 2014.

Mr. Speaker, on December 17, 2015, Nazarene Baptist Church elected its ninth pastor, Reverend Kelvin C. Brooks, Sr. Reverend Brooks, baptized by the late Dr. R.B. House and raised within Nazarene, brought decades of service and dedication to his role. Under his leadership, the church continues to grow spiritually and numerically, building upon of 138 years of transition, perseverance, and faith. As an active member of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc., Louisiana Missionary State Convention, Fourth District Missionary Baptist Association, and East Baton Rouge Parish Ministers Conference, Nazarene remains a vital force in the Baton Rouge community and beyond. I ask my colleagues to join me in honoring Nazarene Baptist Church for its enduring legacy, its spiritual leadership, and its steadfast commitment to advancing the Kingdom of God.

HONORING UNITED STATES ARMY SPECIALIST JAMES MICHAEL YOHN, SR.

Mr. PERRY. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to commend and honor the life of United States Army Specialist James Michael Yohn, Sr., who was killed in action (KIA) while bravely serving our Nation with the 1st Squadron, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment in Mosul, Iraq.

Specialist Yohn dedicated his life to selfless service—both in and out of uniform. He was an athlete from a very young age, played baseball and basketball at a high level, and enjoyed fishing—saying that it was a calming way for him to stop and reflect in peace near the tranquility of the water.

Before enlisting in the United States Army, Specialist Yohn served with the Highspire Volunteer Fire Department for eight years. While serving with distinction for the benefit and safety of his community, he also loved being on the fire engine and making people laugh while performing his duties.

After the terror attacks on September 11, 2001, Specialist Yohn told his mother that he wanted to do something to protect our Nation from present and future barbaric acts of terrorism. Five years later, he enlisted in the Army and attended Basic Training at Fort
