HONORING ROBERT “BOB” BUSCH

(Mr. SMITH of Nebraska asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend his remarks.)

Mr. WHITESIDES. Mr. Speaker, before I came to Congress, I led NASA as chief of staff under President Obama. I believed then, as I believe now, that NASA represents the best of us and the

best of America. We were reminded of its ability to inspire just weeks ago with the triumph of Artemis II.

The sheer historic weight of sending humans around the Moon for the first time stopped our country in its tracks as we watched four brave astronauts take flight. The crew made history on multiple fronts as the most diverse to travel beyond low Earth orbit and by going further into space than anyone had ever been before.

Yet, just days after their launch, the President proposed a massive cut to NASA’s budget, including slashing NASA’s science division, which helps us detect wildfires in our district, fight climate change, and advance innovation.

They tried this last year, and we successfully fought back, making sure that NASA funding levels remained steady. We can, and we will do it again.

Artemis II didn’t happen overnight. It required decades of investment, hard work, and the belief that America can still reach for the stars.

We must reaffirm our commitment to this essential work.

NO WAREHOUSING OF HUMAN BEINGS IN INDUSTRIAL ICE DETENTION CENTERS

(Ms. MORRISON asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend her remarks.)

Ms. MORRISON. Mr. Speaker, today I rise to speak on the importance of the Ban Warehouse Detention Act.

The Trump administration wants to spend \$40 billion for detention centers

to hold human beings. ICE is confining people in windowless rooms with metal bunk beds, a few metal tables, and toilets. This is where they stay all day and all night, sometimes for months.

Trump is planning to give \$40 billion in taxpayer dollars to his megadonors and other private contractors to build and run more ICE detention centers that are literally killing people.

We must pass H.R. 8494, the Ban Warehouse Detention Act, because Americans across the country are standing up and saying, we don't want this.

From New Hampshire to New York, from Oklahoma to Tennessee, to my home State of Minnesota, when Americans find out about ICE's plans to buy massive industrial warehouses to hold nearly 100,000 human beings, they are flooding their city council meetings, putting pressure on their local officials, and demanding that these contracts be canceled. Across red States and blue States alike, Americans are saying that this is not what they want and this is not who we should be.

My own parents escaped brutal repression by the Communist government and fled to the United States seeking the freedom that had been ripped away from them.

Amidst the darkness of war, our culture, our grit, and our resilience have spread across the world.

As the first Vietnamese American to represent Orange County's Little Saigon in Congress, I am proud to share our story on the floor of the House of Representatives to ensure that no Communist regime can rewrite our history.

END THIS WAR

(Ms. KAPTUR asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend her remarks.)

Ms. KAPTUR. Mr. Speaker, I rise tonight to speak of a crisis of the President's own creation due to his war of choice in Iran and the confusion that has caused.

Mr. DAVIS of North Carolina. Mr. Speaker, as we prepare to celebrate 250 years of our Nation's freedom, let us pause and ask: Who really made our freedom possible?

It was those who made the ultimate sacrifice, stories of courage, bravery, and yet heartache.

Gold Star families carry pain every single day. They never stop grieving, but they never stop loving, either. They are left remembering the birthday that will never be celebrated, a chair that sits empty, a voice they will never hear again.

For years, these families have poured their hearts into advocating for the passage of the Honor and Remember Flag, a powerful symbol that ensures their sacrifice is never forgotten.

I call on the President and Congress to stand with these families. Let us remember freedom is not free.
