MORNING-HOUR DEBATE

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Pursuant to the order of the House of January 6, 2026, the Chair will now recognize Members from lists submitted by the majority and minority leaders for morning-hour debate.

HONORING OUR FLOOR DIRECTOR, DENNIS NALLS

(Mr. EMMER of Minnesota was recognized to address the House for 5 minutes.)

Mr. EMMER. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor Dennis Nalls, our floor director, who just concluded one decade of service here in the House of Representatives.

A proud alum of Gonzaga High School and Miami of Ohio, Dennis has left the whip team after more than 3 years with us.

Smart, loyal, always thinking two steps ahead, and a diligent problem

solver, Dennis is someone whom anyone would want to have on the ice with them. More importantly, he is someone whom anyone would want to have going into the corner with them.

As head of our whip operation for the past 2 years, he played a key role in delivering win after win on this floor despite the naysayers and despite the headwinds. He has gained the trust and confidence of Members from across the Conference, allowing us to lead one of the most successful whip operations in recent memory.

I think back to last year's successful passage of the Working Families Tax Cuts, or the One Big Beautiful Bill Act, or as the President now calls it, the one big, beautiful tax cut. For Dennis, the floor team, and our Members, it was a long few days.

Despite being up for more than 40 hours straight—and I think that is light, I think it was over 60 hours straight—in July of 2025, we were able to secure historic tax cuts for the American people, strengthen our border security policies, and make necessary reforms to root out waste, fraud, and abuse.

It is during the “down by a goal with only 2 minutes to play” times when you really rely on your teammates the most, and our House Republican team would not have been able to accomplish any of our wins without Dennis Nalls' help.

I thank Dennis for making the sacrifices to be here, nights away from his family and friends, missed trips and holidays, and weekends spent in the Halls of the Capitol. an attempt to find the truth that she was looking for.

Today, many people confuse the beautiful simple nature of truth found at home as dry and boring ideas that worked in the past, but could never solve the progressive problems posed now in our modern world.

They ignore the rich history of our country, discounting our Nation's Founders and great documents of the past as outdated or primitive. Katie's words touched me, and I am grateful to note that she is not the exception. She is the example, and the example of what makes Utah and this country so special: hope, respect, appreciation, courage, hard work, big dreams, and love for this country.

That is Utah, and I am grateful for the parents who are raising our youth to carry on the torch of liberty and freedom that we have been so blessed with from on high.
