COMBATING ORGANIZED RETAIL CRIME ACT OF 2025

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Pursuant to clause 8 of rule XX, the unfinished business is the vote on the motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill (H.R. 2853) to combat organized crime involving the illegal acquisition of retail goods and cargo for the purpose of selling those illegally obtained goods through physical and online retail marketplaces, as amended, on which the yeas and nays were ordered.

When I was first elected to the Hawaii State Senate, Colleen made history as the first AANHPI woman in the Nation to lead a legislative body. She understood something important about being the first: Your job is to hold the door open so you are not the last.

That is who Colleen was.

At her memorial last week, I looked around the Hawaii Senate floor and saw her legacy everywhere—in the leaders she mentored, the people she believed in, and the confidence she gave so many of us before we saw it in ourselves. It was hard to feel like she was gone because so much of her remains in all of us.

When I think of strength, I think of Colleen. She always had the answers,

but she never needed the spotlight. She pushed others forward while making it clear that she had our backs. As a young mother in public office, she never once made me feel like I had to choose between leading and loving my family.

To her husband, John, who was her rock, and to her beloved fur babies, Frannie and Poppers, and Little, who is up there with her now, they were her soul.

I thank them for sharing Colleen with all of us. They definitely broke the mold when they made her, and I dearly miss my friend.

THANKING LAW ENFORCEMENT

To commemorate all the fallen heroes, last Police Week the House passed my resolution, the Gold Shield Families Resolution. It recognizes the families of first and supports nonprofits for fallen first responders.

I call on all Americans to join me in thanking law enforcement by never failing in our duty to back the blue.

RECOGNIZING SUSTAINABLE WESTCHESTER
