**HONORING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF GARRET ANDERSON**

Mr. MIN. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor the life and legacy of Garret Anderson, a Newport Beach resident and Anaheim Angels legend.

Garret was a SoCal native who grew up in the L.A. suburbs in Granada Hills.

After graduating high school, he was drafted by the Angels in the fourth round of the 1990 draft.

Over 15 seasons with the Angels, he became the franchise's all-time leader in hits and built a career defined by consistency, grit, and leadership in the clubhouse.

His most famous hit was the bases-loaded double he hit in game 7 of the

2002 World Series, which won the Angels their first and only World Series championship.

That 2002 season was a Cinderella journey for Garret and the Angels, with the Rally Monkey inspiring the team to come back in the late innings over and over again.

Garret was a two-time Silver Slugger award winner and was the all-star game MVP in 2003, but those who knew him best remember something beyond his baseball accomplishments. They remember his humility, kindness, and joy inside the clubhouse and outside.

Mr. Speaker, Garret Anderson represented what is best about baseball: dedication, teamwork, and grace both on and off the field. His legacy will live on not just in the record books but in the memories of fans, teammates, and our Orange County communities. Our deepest sympathies are with his family.

#### RECOGNIZING GENERAL ROBERT DUTKO

Mr. CONAWAY. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to recognize General Robert Dutko, whose impressive career of service in the Air National Guard spanned over four decades.

He also shaped how his hometown honored service and sacrifice with his role in programs like Hometown Heroes, ensuring that the service of Ewing residents would be recognized in a meaningful way.

Though, we mourned his lost last month, we will be celebrating his inspiring legacy and service for many years to come.

#### BULLYING TRANS KIDS WON'T END THIS WAR

Ms. STANSBURY. Mr. Speaker, what should have been bipartisan effort to honor and preserve the stories of American women has been hijacked and corrupted.

The original Smithsonian American Women's History Museum Act had

broad bipartisan support because it was rooted in a simple idea that the stories of all women deserve to be told.

Now, it has been hijacked by Republicans to legislate identity and to erase LGBTQ+ Americans' history itself, but unfortunately, this bill is not happening in isolation.

Just before Pride Month, Republicans are voting to advance a bill that would force schools to out trans kids and take away their Federal funding.

Mr. Speaker, let me just say this: Bullying trans kids won't end this war. It won't address the economy. It won't make this country more free, and it won't cover up the deep corruption in the White House itself. It will only hurt our children, and that is why we are a hell, no.

#### IMMIGRANTS DESERVE BETTER

(Ms. MEJIA asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend her remarks.)

Ms. MEJIA. Mr. Speaker, a year ago, I was an advocate standing outside Delaney Hall, a detention center in Newark, New Jersey, demanding our government treat immigrants with justice and human decency.

I watched in horror as Newark Mayor Ras Baraka was dragged across a gate only to be arrested. I was appalled to see three of my now congressional colleagues manhandled with impunity. This week, when I returned to Delaney Hall with two of those same colleagues, I had my worst fears confirmed.

Injustice and suffering are visible in plain sight. Pregnant women writhe in pain without care. An injured man wept in fear for his life, and more alarming, the staff of this facility are

unprepared and unable to care for those in their custody.

I may never forget the faces of those detainees begging for help. These people deserve the fullness of our Constitution and laws. These immigrants deserve humanity, and we must fight for justice if we wish to protect our own.
