MOMENT OF SILENCE HONORING MICHAEL PAHIRA

(Mr. MEUSER asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute.)

Mr. MEUSER. Mr. Speaker, I rise alongside my colleagues with a heavy heart with the Pennsylvania delegation to honor the courageous life and tragic loss of Pennsylvania State Trooper Michael Pahira who was killed earlier this month in the line of duty.

Trooper Michael Pahira was born and raised in my district. He was named for

his father, Michael Sr., and was known as Mikey throughout his life.

Trooper Pahira graduated from North Schuylkill Junior/Senior High School in 2001 where he was a standout football and wrestling star.

After attending East Stroudsburg University, Michael answered the call of service and entered the Pennsylvania State Police Academy, graduating in 2007 as a proud member of 124th Cadet Class of Pennsylvania State Troopers.

Over the next two decades, Trooper Pahira would serve his State with distinction protecting communities in Lehigh, Schuylkill Haven, and Frackville.

I attended the funeral service for Trooper Pahira last week alongside his parents, Michael Sr. and Patricia; his sister, Jennifer; and thousands of community members; fellow police officers; friends, and law enforcement from throughout the State who gathered to honor his legacy.

The stories shared by those who knew him best painted the picture of a man of character, humility, and unwavering dedication. Respect was a constant theme throughout the service. Trooper Pahira lived a life defined by respect for his community, his family, and his fellow troopers.

We can honor the memory of Trooper Pahira and show more respect for the men and women of law enforcement and the communities they serve by implementing some commonsense legislation that can prevent such senseless tragedies from happening again.

On the morning of July 1, Trooper Pahira was on duty conducting a routine commercial vehicle inspection on Route 81 in Schuylkill County when a truck driven by a Michael Bon struck and killed him. Bon was in the country illegally, ordered to deport, did not do so, and was operating a commercial vehicle with a nondomiciled commercial driver's license issued by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

I am calling on every Member of Congress to support Dalilah's Law to bring common sense and strength in commercial driver's license requirements, ensuring those with commercial driver's licenses can read English and are in the United States with legal status. It is our duty to do all we can to provide such safety for law enforcement and everyone on America's roadways.

Trooper Pahira faithfully served the people of Pennsylvania for nearly two decades, and his sacrifice will never be forgotten.

On behalf of the entire Pennsylvania delegation, I want to offer our deepest sorrow and condolences to the Pahira family; his lifelong friends; the great, brave Pennsylvania State Troopers; and all those mourning Mikey's loss.

In honor of Trooper Michael Pahira's life of service, I ask my colleagues to join us in a moment of silence.

— CONTINUATION OF THE NATIONAL EMERGENCY WITH RESPECT TO HOSTAGE-TAKING AND THE WRONGFUL DETENTION OF UNITED STATES NATIONALS ABROAD—MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES (H. DOC. NO. 119-173)

The SPEAKER pro tempore laid before the House the following message from the President of the United States; which was read and, together with the accompanying papers, referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs and ordered to be printed:

To the Congress of the United States:

Section 202(d) of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1622(d)) provides for the automatic termination of a national emergency unless, within 90 days prior to the anniversary date of its declaration, the President publishes in the *Federal Register* and transmits to the Congress a notice stating that the emergency is to continue in effect beyond the anniversary date. In accordance with this provision, I have sent to the *Federal Register* for publication the enclosed notice stating that the national emergency with respect to hostage-taking and the wrongful detention of United States nationals abroad declared in Executive Order 14078 of July 19, 2022, is to continue in effect beyond July 19, 2026.

Hostage-taking and the wrongful detention of United States nationals are heinous acts that undermine the rule of law. Terrorist organizations, criminal groups, and other malicious actors who take hostages for financial, political, or other gain—as well as foreign states that engage in the practice of wrongful detention, including for political leverage or to seek concessions from the United States—threaten the integrity of the International political system and the safety of United States nationals and other persons abroad. Hostage-taking and the wrongful detention of United States nationals abroad continue to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States. Therefore, I have determined that it is necessary to continue the national emergency declared in Executive Order 14078 with respect to hostage-taking and the wrongful de-

tention of United States nationals abroad.

COMMITTEE RESOLUTION

ALTERATION—OPTIMIZATION PROGRAM VARIOUS BUILDINGS

Resolved by the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the United States House of Representatives, that pursuant to 40 U.S.C. § 3307, appropriations are authorized for the reconfiguration and renovation of core assets under the U.S. General Services Administration's (GSA) jurisdiction, custody, or control to support efforts to optimize space configuration and performance; deliver the best value in real estate to GSA's customer agencies across the government; reduce the government's footprint; and achieve significant annual cost savings for taxpayers consistent with the spend plan provided to the Committee on December 3, 2025, dated October 2025, at a total cost of \$254,710,000, a prospectus for which is attached to and included as part of this resolution. This resolution amends the Committee resolution adopted by the Committee on July 15, 2025 by providing additional authorization of \$104,710,000.

Provided, that General Services Administration shall not delegate to any agency the authority granted by this resolution.

Provided further, an updated Expenditure Plan be submitted to the Committee prior to expenditure of any funds.

Provided further, projects funded shall demonstrate a clear connection to long-term footprint reduction, including but not limited to sale, disposal, relinquishment, or substantial reductions in rentable square footage or financial costs.

Provided further, projects funded conform with the requirements established pursuant to the Thomas R. Carper Water Resources Development Act of 2024 (P.L. 118-272), including building utilization requirements and notification of milestones to the Committee.

Provided further, not later than 30 calendar days after the date on which a request from
