Mrs. HARSHBARGER. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor a true daughter of Tennessee, Dolly Parton—a woman who needs no introduction.

Dolly was a native of my district in East Tennessee, and she was from Locust Ridge in Sevier County. She never forgot where she came from. Her music told the truth about hard work, faith,

and family, and that truth is why the whole world fell in love with Dolly.

But it was her heart that made her a legend back home. She rebuilt the community after the wildfires in 2016 that tore through Sevier County. She opened doors for children to learn to read through her Imagination Library. She supported healthcare and research for Tennessee families. She protected the mountains that she loved. Most people will know her theme park that is in the district called Dollywood.

She was guided by her faith and her East Tennessee upbringing, and Dolly used her success to lift people up around her at every turn.

My prayers are with her family and everyone who loved her. The Tennessee delegation is committed to ensuring that her legacy is remembered for generations to come.

Mr. Speaker, I yield to the gentleman from Tennessee (Mr. COHEN), my colleague.

Mr. COHEN. Mr. Speaker, this is my first opportunity to serve as the dean of the Tennessee delegation, and it didn't come too soon. Time is running out.

Dolly Parton was a phenomenal Tennessean, probably the best representative we ever had. She never looked down on anybody. She had a big heart. Whenever there was a tragedy or somebody in need, she came forward and wanted it to be anonymous. She was a good human being, and she had a beautiful voice.

I had a friend who was involved in the music business in the early seventies in Laurel Canyon when the Eagles and others were getting together. He told me about Dolly being out there, and that is where she got to know Linda Ronstadt and others. He said she had such a beautiful voice, and she did.

She will be remembered forever for all she did for humanity. Tennessee is proud to have her and will always love her.

Mrs. HARSHBARGER. Mr. Speaker, she was a funny lady. She had a lot of quick sayings—and I won't go into that—but we lost an icon, not just to us in Tennessee but to the world.

HONORING CAMERON DAVIS CAPARA AND VINCENT ANTHONY SIQUEIROS

Mrs. GRIJALVA. Today, we honor the lives of Cameron Davis Capara and Vincent Anthony Siqueiros, who were taken from us far too soon in an act of gun violence and hate at the Venture-N in Tucson, Arizona, a cherished place for queer people across the city.

This type of targeted violence does not happen in a vacuum. It is cul-

tivated by anti-LGBTQ rhetoric, laws, policies, and executive orders. And it is a direct consequence of this body's failure to act on gun violence.

Cameron and Vincent should still be alive today.

Mr. Speaker, how many more parents need to bury their children before Congress takes action to address the gun violence epidemic? How many more people need to die before this Chamber stands up to the gun lobby?

Our communities are sick and tired of hearing our thoughts and prayers. We should be acting today to pass commonsense gun safety laws and to combat hate and violence targeting our LGBTQ folks.

Mr. Speaker, I ask all of my colleagues to join members of the Arizona delegation and the Congressional Equality Caucus in a moment of silence to honor their lives and commit this Chamber to action.

CALLING FOR SHUTDOWN OF DILLEY

(Ms. RIVAS asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend her remarks.)

Ms. RIVAS. Mr. Speaker, during the August work period, I visited the Dilley family immigration detention center with my colleagues to see conditions firsthand.

Over 500 people are being detained in inhumane conditions, including pregnant women, children, infants, and babies who are just 2 months old. These

individuals should be living their lives, getting ready for school, and raising their families. Children should not be detained.

Dilley must be shut down, and ICE must be abolished.

While Republicans continue to let ICE run out of control, working families are struggling to afford basic essentials like groceries.

I visited the North Valley Caring Services in North Hills to see the work that the L.A. Regional Food Bank does to help families who are struggling with food insecurity. I spoke with healthcare workers about the importance of protecting Medicare for our constituents. I visited a Head Start program to learn about how Republicans' cuts make it harder for working families to thrive.

What I heard from my constituents at all of these visits is that they need relief from Republicans' affordability crisis.

FREE SAMA SAFI NOW

(Ms. TLAIB asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend her remarks.)

Ms. TLAIB. Mr. Speaker, free Sama Safi now.

Sama Safi is a 20-year-old U.S. citizen and honors student of psychology who was kidnapped from her home in the middle of the night by the Israeli forces. For exactly 3 months today, Sama has been suffering in the Israeli military prisons.

Sama has a severe chronic medical condition that requires daily medication. Her doctors say that she could have irreversible organ damage.

Mr. Speaker, 40 of my colleagues and I, along with 6 Senators, sent a letter to Secretary Rubio demanding him to work on her release immediately.

I have actually spoken directly to Sama's parents, who are terrified for their daughter. They tell me that they wake up every morning hoping to hear Sama playing her music. They told me that Ben-Gvir, Israel's Minister of National Security, went to the women's prison where Sama is being held, and he taunted the prisoners and assaulted detainees. He mocked the inhumane conditions, saying that it is what they deserve.

Sama doesn't deserve this. No one does. She deserves to be home with her family, studying for her classes.

Free Sama now.

RESTORE LAHAINA POSTAL SERVICES

(Ms. TOKUDA asked and was given permission to address the House for 1 minute and to revise and extend her remarks.)

Ms. TOKUDA. Mr. Speaker, 3 years after the Lahaina wildfires, survivors are rebuilding and finally returning home. They should be welcomed back and not told that the basic services they had before the fire are now gone.
