S. Con. Res. 29. A concurrent resolution authorizing the use of Emancipation Hall in the Capitol Visitor Center for an event to celebrate the birthday of King Kamehameha I; considered and agreed to.

#### ADDITIONAL COSPONSORS

S. 28

At the request of Mr. CRUZ, the name of the Senator from Georgia (Mr. WARNOCK) was added as a cosponsor of S. 28, a bill to require the disclosure of a camera or recording capability in certain internet-connected devices.

S. 567

At the request of Mr. WHITEHOUSE, the names of the Senator from Pennsylvania (Mr. MCCORMICK), the Senator from Alabama (Mrs. BRITT) and the Senator from Idaho (Mr. RISCH) were added as cosponsors of S. 567, a bill to award a Congressional Gold Medal, collectively, to the First Rhode Island Regiment, in recognition of their dedicated service during the Revolutionary War.

S. 1088

At the request of Mrs. SHAHEEN, the names of the Senator from Florida (Mr. SCOTT) and the Senator from Pennsylvania (Mr. MCCORMICK) were added as cosponsors of S. 1088, a bill to provide that the memorial to commemorate the sacrifice and service of the women who worked on the home front to support the efforts of the United States military during World War II may be located on the National Mall, and for other purposes.

S. 1395

At the request of Mr. COONS, the name of the Senator from Maryland (Ms. ALSOBROOKS) was added as a cosponsor of S. 1395, a bill to authorize the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out activities to reduce food loss and waste, and for other purposes.

S. 1454

At the request of Mr. KENNEDY, the name of the Senator from Pennsylvania (Mr. MCCORMICK) was added as a cosponsor of S. 1454, a bill to amend the Animal Welfare Act to provide for greater protection of roosters, and for other purposes.

S. 1532

At the request of Mr. CRAPO, the name of the Senator from Ohio (Mr. MORENO) was added as a cosponsor of S. 1532, a bill to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to modify the railroad track maintenance credit.

S. 1555

At the request of Ms. ERNST, the name of the Senator from Nevada (Ms. CORTEZ MASTO) was added as a cosponsor of S. 1555, a bill to increase loan limits for loans made to small manufacturers, and for other purposes.

S. 1651

At the request of Mr. MULLIN, the name of the Senator from Idaho (Mr. RISCH) was added as a cosponsor of S. 1651, a bill to require the Federal Com-

munications Commission to ensure equitable and nondiscriminatory contributions to the mechanisms that preserve and advance universal service, to reduce the financial burden on consumers, and for other purposes.

S. 3208

At the request of Mr. CURTIS, the name of the Senator from New Hampshire (Mrs. SHAHEEN) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3208, a bill to codify the Six Assurances to Taiwan, provide congressional review of the Six Assurances, protect Taiwan from coercion, and for other purposes.

S. 3257

At the request of Mr. HOEVEN, the names of the Senator from Idaho (Mr. CRAPO) and the Senator from Delaware (Mr. COONS) were added as cosponsors of S. 3257, a bill to require the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration to revise regulations for certain individuals carrying out aviation activities who disclose a mental health diagnosis or condition, and for other purposes.

S. 3304

At the request of Mr. WICKER, the name of the Senator from Delaware (Mr. COONS) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3304, a bill to provide for the coverage of medical food and vitamins and individual amino acids for digestive and inherited metabolic disorders under Federal health programs, to ensure State and Federal protection for existing coverage, and for other purposes.

S. 3556

At the request of Ms. ALSOBROOKS, the names of the Senator from Pennsylvania (Mr. MCCORMICK) and the Senator from California (Mr. SCHIFF) were added as cosponsors of S. 3556, a bill to reauthorize and improve the wildlife crossings program, and for other purposes.

S. 3654

At the request of Mr. BLUMENTHAL, the names of the Senator from Georgia (Mr. OSSOFF), the Senator from Nevada (Ms. ROSEN) and the Senator from New York (Mrs. GILLIBRAND) were added as cosponsors of S. 3654, a bill to improve housing and environmental health and safety protections for members of the Armed Forces and their families residing in military family housing, and for other purposes.

S. 3788

At the request of Mr. SCOTT of Florida, the name of the Senator from Idaho (Mr. RISCH) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3788, a bill to amend the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act to require drug labeling to include original manufacturer and supply chain information.

S. 3958

At the request of Mrs. GILLIBRAND, the name of the Senator from New Jersey (Mr. KIM) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3958, a bill to amend the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008 to transition Puerto Rico to the supplemental nutri-

tion assistance program, and for other purposes.

S. 4001

At the request of Ms. WARREN, the name of the Senator from New Mexico (Mr. LUJÁN) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4001, a bill to amend title XVI of the Social Security Act to update eligibility for the supplemental security income program, and for other purposes.

S. 4023

At the request of Mr. YOUNG, the name of the Senator from New Mexico (Mr. LUJÁN) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4023, a bill to establish the America's Living Library Project, and for other purposes.

S. 4063

At the request of Mr. CRUZ, the name of the Senator from Pennsylvania (Mr. MCCORMICK) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4063, a bill to impose sanctions on the Polisario Front if it cooperates with an Iranian-affiliated terrorist organization.

S. 4064

At the request of Mr. BOOZMAN, the names of the Senator from Ohio (Mr. HUSTED) and the Senator from Ohio (Mr. MORENO) were added as cosponsors of S. 4064, a bill to provide for a system of regulation of the offer and sale of digital commodities by the Commodity Futures Trading Commission, and for other purposes.

S. 4066

At the request of Mr. HAWLEY, the name of the Senator from North Carolina (Mr. BUDD) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4066, a bill to provide that the approved application under the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act for the drug mifepristone for the purpose of the termination of intrauterine pregnancy is deemed to have been withdrawn, to establish a Federal tort for harm to women caused by chemical abortion drugs, and for other purposes.

S. 4146

At the request of Ms. LUMMIS, the names of the Senator from Florida (Mr. SCOTT) and the Senator from Alabama (Mrs. BRITT) were added as cosponsors of S. 4146, a bill to amend the Endangered Species Act of 1973 with respect to the listing of threatened and endangered species, and for other purposes.

#### SUBMITTED RESOLUTIONS

SENATE RESOLUTION 657—COMMENDING TAIWAN ON THE 30TH ANNIVERSARY OF ITS FIRST DIRECT PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION IN 1996, AND EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR TAIWAN IN THE PRESERVATION OF ITS DEMOCRATIC INSTITUTIONS

Ms. DUCKWORTH (for herself, Mr. CURTIS, Mr. KAINE, Mr. RICKETTS, Mr. MERKLEY, Mr. SCOTT of Florida, Mr. VAN HOLLEN, Mr. CRUZ, Ms. ROSEN, Mr. BENNET, and Mr. FETTERMAN) submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations:

## S RES. 657

Whereas Taiwan, the government of which officially calls itself the Republic of China, began transitioning to a liberal democracy in the late 1980s, lifted martial law in 1987, and held its first direct legislative election in 1992;

Whereas, on March 23, 1996, the people of Taiwan held their first direct presidential election, marking a historic milestone in Taiwan's democratic development;

Whereas Taiwan has now held 8 presidential and multiple legislative and local elections since its democratic transition, all of which were free, fair, and representative of the will of the people of Taiwan;

Whereas Taiwan has demonstrated the strength of its democratic system through multiple peaceful transfers of political power, which is a bedrock of a free, stable, and representative political system;

Whereas the democratic institutions of Taiwan codify the freedoms of speech, press, assembly, and religion into law, and the citizens of Taiwan have exercised these freedoms in practice to build a vibrant civil society, a strong journalistic and media sector, and an advanced business community;

Whereas Taiwan has continued to strengthen and safeguard its democratic system in the face of growing military, economic, and political pressure from the People's Republic of China;

Whereas the people of Taiwan have shown resilience and steadfast commitment to democratic values despite ongoing coercion and intimidation;

Whereas Taiwan's democracy and respect for the rule of law contribute to peace, stability, and prosperity in the Indo-Pacific region;

Whereas the Taiwan Relations Act (22 U.S.C. 3301 et seq.) and the Six Assurances, which were originally conveyed by President Ronald Reagan to Taiwan in 1982, remain fundamental elements of United States policy toward Taiwan; and

Whereas the people of the United States and the people of Taiwan continue to stand as partners against coercion, and threats to regional peace and stability: Now, therefore, be it

*Resolved,*

**SECTION 1. COMMEMORATION STATEMENT.**

The Senate of the United States—

(1) commemorates the historic significance of Taiwan's first direct presidential election, which was held on March 23, 1996;

(2) commends Taiwan for building and sustaining a robust democratic system, and the example it has set for self-governance, not just for the Pacific region, but for the world;

(3) regards the democracy of Taiwan as a great strategic strength for the free world and a key component of strong and enduring United States-Taiwan relations;

(4) is committed to supporting Taiwan's self-defense and the liberty of its people; and

(5) remains committed to the United States policy toward Taiwan that has been established by the Taiwan Relations Act (Public Law 96-8; 22 U.S.C. 3301 et seq.), the Three Communiqués, and the Six Assurances towards Taiwan.

**SEC. 2. RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.**

Nothing in this resolution may be construed as authorizing the use of military force.

**SENATE RESOLUTION 658—EX-PRESSING SUPPORT FOR THE DESIGNATION OF THE WEEK OF APRIL 6 THROUGH APRIL 10, 2026, AS “NATIONAL ASSISTANT PRINCIPALS WEEK”**

Mr. DURBIN (for himself, Ms. HIRONO, Mr. HEINRICH, and Mr. LUJÁN) submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions:

## S. RES. 658

Whereas the National Association of Secondary School Principals (referred to in this preamble as “NASSP”), the National Association of Elementary School Principals (referred to in this preamble as “NAESP”), and the American Federation of School Administrators have designated the week of April 6 through April 10, 2026, as “National Assistant Principals Week”;

Whereas an assistant principal, as a member of the school administration, interacts with many sectors of the school community, including support staff, instructional staff, students, and parents;

Whereas assistant principals are responsible for establishing a positive learning environment and building strong relationships between their school and community;

Whereas assistant principals play a pivotal role in the instructional leadership of their schools by supervising student instruction, mentoring teachers, recognizing the achievements of staff, encouraging collaboration among staff, ensuring the implementation of best practices, monitoring student achievement and progress, facilitating and modeling data-driven decision making to inform instruction, and guiding the direction of targeted intervention and school improvement;

Whereas the day-to-day logistical operations of schools require assistant principals to monitor and address facility needs, attendance, transportation issues, and scheduling challenges, as well as to supervise extra- and co-curricular events;

Whereas assistant principals are entrusted with maintaining an inviting, safe, and orderly school environment that supports the growth and achievement of each and every student by nurturing positive peer relationships, recognizing student achievement, mediating conflicts, analyzing behavior patterns, providing interventions, and, when necessary, taking disciplinary actions;

Whereas, since its establishment in 2004, the NASSP National Assistant Principal of the Year Program has recognized outstanding middle and high school assistant principals who demonstrate success in leadership, curriculum, and personalization;

Whereas the NAESP National Outstanding Assistant Principal Program promotes the fundamental importance of the assistant principal and honors exceptional elementary and middle-level assistant principals who demonstrate excellence in educational leadership and set high standards for students, colleagues, parents, and the community; and

Whereas the week of April 6 through April 10, 2026, is an appropriate week to designate as “National Assistant Principals Week”:

Now, therefore, be it

*Resolved,* That the Senate—

(1) supports the designation of “National Assistant Principals Week”;

(2) honors the contributions of assistant principals to the success of students in the United States; and

(3) encourages the people of the United States to observe National Assistant Principals Week with appropriate ceremonies and activities that promote awareness of the role

played by assistant principals in school leadership and ensuring that every child has access to a high-quality education.

**SENATE RESOLUTION 659—CELEBRATING THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE AMERICAN SHORE AND BEACH PRESERVATION ASSOCIATION**

Mr. WHITEHOUSE (for himself and Mr. CASSIDY) submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary:

## S. RES. 659

Whereas the year 2026 marks the centennial of the American Shore and Beach Preservation Association (in this preamble referred to as the “Association”), which has for a century advanced a science-guided commitment to coastal restoration and protection;

Whereas, in 1926, the Association's visionary leaders sought to establish a forum “where the novice and he who has long wrestled with these problems can seek more light; where the man of science and the statesman can exchange ideas and collaborate together; where idealist and lover of Nature and the economist can arrive at a mutual understanding; where landscape artist and philanthropist can find an outlet for their activities,” thereby fostering collaboration and innovation for coastal stewardship;

Whereas the critical issues of shore and beach preservation, which promote community protection, a strong economy, ecological health, and recreation, remain as vital in 2026 as they were at the time of the Association's founding;

Whereas United States coastal communities and natural resources have benefitted from the Association's work in translating coastal science and engineering, guiding policy, and advocating for resilient shores and beaches over the past century; and

Whereas, in 2026, the Association is celebrating its 100th anniversary: Now, therefore, be it

*Resolved,* That the Senate—

(1) recognizes and celebrates the 100th anniversary of the American Shore and Beach Preservation Association (in this resolution referred to as the “Association”);

(2) commemorates the centennial of the Association, honoring a century of shore and beach preservation and progress; and

(3) congratulates the leaders and members of the Association on a century of dedication to the shores and beaches of the United States and recognizes the enduring importance of its mission.
