

ARMS SALES NOTIFICATION

Mr. RISCH. Mr. President, section 36(b) of the Arms Export Control Act requires that Congress receive prior notification of certain proposed arms sales as defined by that statute. Upon such notification, the Congress has 30 calendar days during which the sale may be reviewed. The provision stipulates that, in the Senate, the notification of proposed sales shall be sent to the chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

In keeping with the committee's intention to see that relevant information is still available to the full Senate, I ask unanimous consent to have printed in the RECORD the notifications that have been received. If the cover letter references a classified annex, then such an annex is available to all Senators in the office of the Foreign Relations Committee, room SD-423.

Report of Enhancement or Upgrade of Sensitivity of Technology or Capability (Sec. 36(b)(5)(A), AECA)

(i) Prospective Purchaser: Government of Singapore.

(ii) Sec. 36(b)(1), AECA Transmittal No.: 23-03; Date: February 9, 2023; Implementing Agency: Air Force.

Funding Source: National Funds.

(iii) Description: On February 9, 2023, Congress was notified by congressional certification transmittal number 23-03 of the possible sale, under Section 36(b)(1) of the Arms Export Control Act, of one hundred (100) KMU-1556 tail kits for Joint Direct Attack Munition (JDAM) GBU-31; nine hundred (900) KMU-572 tail kits for JDAM GBU-38 and Laser JDAM GBU-54; two hundred fifty (250) MAU-169 Computer Control Groups for 500-lb Paveway-II (PWII) GBU-12; and two hundred fifty (250) MXU-650 Air Foil Groups for 500-lb PWII GBU-12. The following items were also included: DSU-38 laser guidance sets; Common Munitions Built-In-Test/Reprogramming Equipment; spare parts, consumables, accessories, and repair and returns support; aircraft and munitions support and support equipment; personnel training and training equipment; unclassified software; unclassified technical books and other publications; U.S. Government and contractor engineering, technical, and logistics support services,

studies and surveys; and other related elements of program and logistics support. The estimated total value was \$55 million. Major defense equipment (MDE) constituted \$37 million of this total.

On September 18, 2024, Congress was notified by congressional certification transmittal number 24-08 of the possible sale, under section 36(b)(5)(C) of the Arms Export Control Act, of the addition of the following MDE items: two hundred ninety (290) KMU-556 tail kits for JDAM GBU-31; nine hundred sixty-four (964) KMU-572 tail kits for JDAM GBU-38 and Laser JDAM GBU-54. The following non-MDE items were also included: bomb components; aircraft component parts and accessories; and logistics and program support. The estimated total value of the new items was \$63 million. The total MDE value was increased by \$55 million to a revised \$92 million. The total non-MDE value was increased by \$8 million to a revised \$26 million. The estimated total case value was increase by \$63 million to a revised \$118 million. MDE constituted \$92 million of this total.

This transmittal notifies the inclusion of the following additional MDE items: one hundred sixty-five (165) MAU-169 Computer Control Groups for 500-lb Paveway-II (PWII) GBU-12; and one hundred sixty-five (165) MXU-650 Air Foil Groups for 500-lb PWII GBU-12. The following non-MDE items will also be included: logistics and program support. The estimated total cost of the new items is \$24 million. The estimated MDE value will increase by \$3 million to a revised \$95 million. The estimated non-MDE value will increase by \$21 million to a revised \$47 million. The estimated total case value will increase by \$24 million to a revised \$142 million. MDE constitutes \$95 million of this total.

(iv) Significance: This notification accounts for requested additional MDE and non-MDE items not included in the original notification. The inclusion of this MDE and non-MDE represents an increase in capability over what was previously notified. The proposed sale will improve Singapore's capability to maintain operational readiness and interoperability with U.S. and coalition forces.

(v) Justification: This proposed sale will enhance the foreign policy and national security objectives of the United States by improving the security of a strategic partner that is an important force for political stability and economic progress in Asia.

(vi) Sensitivity of Technology: The Sensitivity of Technology statement contained in the original notification applies to items reported here.

The highest level of classification of defense articles, components, and services included in this potential sale is SECRET.

ADDITIONAL STATEMENTS

REMEMBERING ROBERT "BOBBY" DOUGLAS

• Mr. KELLY. Mr. President, I rise today to honor the life and legacy of Robert "Bobby" Edward Douglas, an Olympian, coach, mentor, and one of the most respected figures in American wrestling.

Born in Bellaire, OH, on March 27, 1942, Bobby Douglas overcame significant adversity early in life and developed the resilience and determination

that would define both his athletic and coaching career. Throughout his career, he demonstrated exceptional leadership, discipline, and dedication to the athletes and communities he served.

Coach Douglas was one of the first Black wrestlers to represent the United States at the Olympic Games, competing in the 1964 Tokyo Olympics at a time when opportunities for Black athletes in many sports remained limited. He later served as captain of the 1968 U.S. Olympic wrestling team and earned silver and bronze medals at the World Championships, establishing himself as one of the top wrestlers of his era.

In 1973, Coach Douglas became the first Black head coach of a major college wrestling program when he was hired at the University of California, Santa Barbara. In 1975, he came to Arizona where he helped build Arizona State University into a national wrestling powerhouse and led the Sun Devils to the program's first and only NCAA wrestling national championship in 1988. During his 17 seasons leading the program, ASU produced 59 All-Americans, three NCAA individual champions, Olympians, and generations of student-athletes who carried forward the lessons he taught both on and off the mat. During his time at ASU, Coach Douglas was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year eight times.

Coach Douglas later spent 14 seasons as head coach at Iowa State University, where he accumulated 198 victories and coached 3 teams to runner-up finishes at the NCAA Championships. In 2000, he was named the National Wrestling Coaches Association National Coach of the Year.

His contributions extended far beyond collegiate wrestling. Coach Douglas served for many years as a dedicated coach for USA Wrestling and later served as head coach of the 1992 U.S. Olympic wrestling team, which earned six medals at the Barcelona Olympic Games. He also served as head coach for the U.S. World Championship teams in 1989 and 1991.

Over the course of his career, Coach Douglas became one of only 4 collegiate wrestling coaches to win more than 400 dual matches, finishing with 427 career victories. In 1987, he was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame as a Distinguished Member and later earned induction into the Arizona State University Hall of Fame, the Iowa State Hall of Fame, the Glen Brand Wrestling Hall of Fame, the NAIA Hall of Fame, and the West Liberty Hall of Fame.

Coach Douglas passed away on February 23, 2026, at the age of 83. His passing is a tremendous loss for Arizona, Arizona State University, and the generations of athletes and families whose lives he impacted throughout his career.

Former wrestlers and colleagues consistently described Coach Douglas as disciplined and deeply committed to the success of his athletes. He emphasized accountability, hard work, and

integrity, and he remained dedicated to mentoring young wrestlers long after his collegiate coaching career ended through camps, clinics, and community programs in Arizona and across the country.

Arizona is stronger because of Coach Douglas' leadership, mentorship, and commitment to young people. His legacy will continue to be felt through the athletes, coaches, and families he inspired throughout his remarkable life.

My thoughts are with his wife Jackie Davis Douglas; his son Bobby Douglas, Jr.; his former athletes and colleagues; and all those mourning his loss. We honor Coach Bobby Douglas' lifetime of achievement and celebrate the lasting impact he had on Arizona and our Nation.●
