#### RECOGNIZING VIRGINIA AMERICAN REVOLUTION 250TH COMMISSION AND LAND SPEED RECORD HOLDER

● Mr. KAINE. Mr. President, as we celebrate our Nation's 250th anniversary, I would like to recognize the Virginia American Revolution 250th Commission, which was formed to celebrate the Commonwealth's contribution to the Nation upon the 250th anniversary of its independence from Great Britain, and the VA 250 Car Project, which is part of a national motorsports celebration in honor of the United States of America's semiquincentennial.

The Virginia American Revolution 250th Commission is chaired by Delegate Terry Austin of Botetourt County, VA. Danny Turner, former mayor of Martinsville, VA, Joey Arrington of Henry County, VA, and former Congressman Virgil Goode of Rocky Mount, VA, devised the VA 250 Car Project.

Additionally, on March 23, 2026, the car known as the "Martinsville Missile" broke the land speed record for stock cars at the Launch and Land facility in Cape Canaveral, FL. The top was 253.1 mph, breaking the former record of 244.9 mph set back in 2007. The "Martinsville Missile" is a 1969 Dodge Daytona Charger with a 358-cubic-inch engine generating over 1,000 horsepower at 9,500 rpm. The car and engine were built by Joey Arrington in Martinsville, VA. The car was driven by Tommy Hurley of Ridgeway, VA.

I salute this thrilling record, the driver who set it, the long tradition of motorsports in Virginia, and the deep contributions of Virginia to America's history.●

#### REMEMBERING JIM COLBERT

● Mr. MARSHALL. Mr. President, I rise today to honor the life and legacy of Jim Colbert, a legendary golfer and proud Kansan whose remarkable career has inspired countless fans and athletes across Kansas and our Nation.

Born in Elizabeth, NJ, Colbert came to Kansas State University in 1961 on a

football scholarship. After injuries ended his football career, he turned his focus to golf, beginning a journey that would define the rest of his life. As a three-year letterwinner for the Wildcats, Colbert quickly established himself as one of the Nation's top collegiate golfers, finishing runner-up at the 1964 NCAA Championship and the Big Eight Championship that same year.

After turning professional in 1965, Colbert built an extraordinary career on the PGA Tour and PGA TOUR Champions circuit. Over the course of his professional career, he earned 28 combined victories, including 8 PGA Tour wins and 20 Champions Tour titles, placing him among the winningest players in senior tour history. His accomplishments included victories at the Texas Open, Colonial National Invitational, and the 1993 Ford Senior Players Championship. He was also named PGA TOUR Champions Player of the Year in both 1995 and 1996.

Beyond his success on the course, Colbert became one of the most recognizable personalities in golf. Known for his trademark bucket hat and competitive spirit, he also made significant contributions as a broadcaster, entrepreneur, and ambassador for the game. He worked as a golf analyst for ESPN and later founded a successful golf course management company that owned and operated courses across the country.

Perhaps nowhere is Colbert's legacy more visible than in Manhattan, KS, where he helped develop Colbert Hills Golf Course, now regarded as one of the premier public golf courses in Kansas and home to Kansas State's golf programs. His dedication to the university and the Manhattan community reflected the deep pride he carried for Kansas throughout his life.

Despite being diagnosed with prostate cancer in 1996, Colbert returned to competitive golf and captured another tournament victory in 1998, earning the PGA TOUR Champions Comeback Player of the Year Award. His determination and resilience inspired many both within and beyond the golf community.

Above all, Colbert was a devoted husband, father, and grandfather. He will be remembered not only for his remarkable achievements in professional golf, but also for his generosity, perseverance, and contributions to Kansas State athletics.

I now ask my colleagues to join me in honoring Jim Colbert and in expressing our gratitude for the lasting impact he made on the game of golf and the people of Kansas.●

After only 4 months as a full-time deputy, he made the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty. His willingness to step forward and serve speaks volumes about his character, sense of duty, and commitment to others.

As the anniversary of his passing comes around each year, it is important that we remember Deputy Windsor's life and impact that he continues to make in his community. The people of Alabama remain forever indebted to him and to all law enforcement officers who put themselves in harm's way in service. His bravery lives on in the lives of his family and friends.

My wife Suzanne and I extend our heartfelt prayers to Deputy Windsor's family, friends, fellow deputies, and all those who knew and loved him as they celebrate the legacy Deputy Windsor has left behind. ##### ENROLLED BILL SIGNED

S. 4530. An act to amend chapters 83 and 84 of title 5, United States Code, to authorize an increase of the retirement age for members of the Capitol Police.
