

Mrs. Cole, one of its reading clerks, announced that the Speaker has signed the following enrolled bill:

S. 4530. An act to amend chapters 83 and 84 of title 5, United States Code, to authorize an increase of the retirement age for members of the Capitol Police.

The enrolled bill was subsequently signed by the Acting President pro tempore (Mr. MORENO).
