

(Mrs. HYDE-SMITH) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3394, a bill to direct the United States Sentencing Commission to amend the sentencing guideline relating to child sexual abuse material.

S. 3397

At the request of Mr. GRASSLEY, the name of the Senator from Mississippi (Mrs. HYDE-SMITH) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3397, a bill to make coercion of children to commit harm a criminal offense, and for other purposes.

S. 3398

At the request of Mr. GRASSLEY, the name of the Senator from Mississippi (Mrs. HYDE-SMITH) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3398, a bill to amend title 18, United States Code, to criminalize intentional threats to distribute child sexual abuse material, and to provide appropriate penalties for the use of child sexual abuse material to extort or coerce victims.

S. 3452

At the request of Mr. COTTON, the name of the Senator from Pennsylvania (Mr. McCORMICK) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3452, a bill to restrict the export to foreign entities of concern of United States intellectual property and sensitive information related to synthetic biology, and for other purposes.

S. 3473

At the request of Mr. CASSIDY, the name of the Senator from North Carolina (Mr. TILLIS) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3473, a bill to amend title XVIII of the Social Security Act to encourage Medicare beneficiaries to voluntarily adopt advance directives guiding the medical care they receive.

S. 3581

At the request of Mr. WHITEHOUSE, the name of the Senator from Colorado (Mr. HICKENLOOPER) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3581, a bill to prohibit the payment of certain legal settlements to any individual convicted of assaulting a law enforcement officer in connection with breaching the Capitol on January 6, 2021.

S. 3582

At the request of Mr. PADILLA, the name of the Senator from Colorado (Mr. HICKENLOOPER) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3582, a bill to prohibit the use of Federal funds to compensate individuals who were prosecuted for their involvement in the attack on the United States Capitol on January 6, 2021, and for other purposes.

S. 3682

At the request of Mr. VAN HOLLEN, the name of the Senator from Virginia (Mr. WARNER) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3682, a bill to promote the creation of data center load queues and data center-specific rate classes to mitigate the impact of data centers on other electricity consumers, and for other purposes.

S. 4009

At the request of Mr. CRUZ, the name of the Senator from California (Mr.

SCHIFF) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4009, a bill to provide for the imposition of sanctions with respect to forced organ harvesting within the People's Republic of China, and for other purposes.

S. 4172

At the request of Ms. COLLINS, the name of the Senator from New Jersey (Mr. BOOKER) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4172, a bill to amend the Animal Welfare Act to allow for the retirement of certain animals used in Federal research, and for other purposes.

S. 4329

At the request of Mrs. BLACKBURN, the name of the Senator from Utah (Mr. LEE) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4329, a bill to amend title X of the Public Health Service Act to prohibit family planning grants from being awarded to any entity that performs abortions, and for other purposes.

S. 4367

At the request of Mr. JUSTICE, the name of the Senator from Mississippi (Mr. WICKER) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4367, a bill to amend the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008 to modify the definition of food.

S. 4480

At the request of Ms. BLUNT ROCH-ESTER, the name of the Senator from Delaware (Mr. COONS) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4480, a bill to direct the Secretary of Health and Human Services to issue guidance on coverage under the Medicaid program under title XIX of the Social Security Act of certain pelvic health services furnished during the postpartum period, and for other purposes.

S. 4551

At the request of Mr. SANDERS, the name of the Senator from New York (Mrs. GILLIBRAND) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4551, a bill to amend the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 to establish a minimum salary threshold for bona fide executive, administrative, and professional employees exempt from Federal overtime compensation requirements, and automatically update such threshold each year, and for other purposes.

S. 4567

At the request of Mr. LUJÁN, the name of the Senator from Massachusetts (Mr. MARKEY) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4567, a bill to amend the Higher Education Act of 1965 to provide enhanced student loan relief to educators, and for other purposes.

S. 4568

At the request of Mr. MERKLEY, the name of the Senator from Rhode Island (Mr. WHITEHOUSE) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4568, a bill to amend the definition of professional student in the Higher Education Act of 1965.

S. 4588

At the request of Mr. WYDEN, the name of the Senator from Minnesota (Ms. KLOBUCHAR) was added as a cosponsor of S. 4588, a bill to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to in-

crease the excise tax for the repurchase of corporate stock by large oil and gas companies.

S. RES. 755

Whereas Donald W. Riegle, Jr., honorably served the people of Michigan and the United States over a public career spanning nearly 3 decades;

Whereas Senator Riegle was born on February 4, 1938, in Flint, Michigan, and was 1 of 3 children of Dorothy Grace Riegle and Donald Wayne Riegle, who owned a printing business and was a mayor of Flint;

Whereas Senator Riegle was a graduate of Flint Central High School, attended Flint Junior College and Western Michigan University, and graduated with a bachelor's degree in business administration and economics from the University of Michigan—Flint in 1960;

Whereas Senator Riegle received a Master of Business Administration in finance from Michigan State University in 1961 and went on to pursue doctoral studies in business and government relations at Harvard Business School while working as a financial analyst at IBM;

Whereas Senator Riegle also served as a faculty member, teaching at Michigan State University, Boston University, and Harvard University before running for Congress;

Whereas Senator Riegle was first elected to the United States House of Representatives in 1966 at the age of 28, when he ran as a Republican in the traditionally Democratic 7th Congressional District of Michigan, and represented the District as a Republican from 1967 to 1973;

Whereas, having grown increasingly disenchanted with President Richard M. Nixon over the Vietnam War, civil rights, and other issues, Senator Riegle switched parties and represented the 7th Congressional District of Michigan as a member of the Democratic Party from 1973 to 1977;

Whereas, while in the House of Representatives, Senator Riegle was one of the co-sponsors of the Equal Credit Opportunity Act (15 U.S.C. 1691 et seq.), which outlaws discrimination on the basis of sex or marital status in granting credit and was signed into law by President Gerald Ford on October 28 1974;

Whereas Senator Riegle was elected to the United States Senate in 1976 and served 3 terms, from 1977 to 1995;

Whereas Senator Riegle served as Chairman of the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs of the Senate, where he played a leading role in shaping national policy on financial institutions, housing, and economic development, including the Riegle Community Development and Regulatory Improvement Act of 1994 (Public Law 103-325; 108 Stat. 2160) that—

(1) established the Community Development Financial Institutions Fund to seed and support financial institutions dedicated to supporting community development;

(2) increased consumer protections for high rate home equity loans;

(3) increased credit availability to small businesses;

(4) streamlined the regulation of depository institutions; and

(5) reformed the National Flood Insurance Program;

Whereas Senator Riegle also served as Chairman of the Subcommittee on Health for Families and the Uninsured of the Committee on Finance of the Senate and brought attention to, and encouraged policy discussion of, the growing number of people of the United States without health insurance due to rising costs, job loss, and gaps in employer-based coverage;

Whereas Senator Riegle was a steadfast advocate for Michigan's manufacturing econ-

omy, took a lead role in passing legislation to rescue the Chrysler Corporation from bankruptcy in 1979, and steadfastly championed issues in support of working families and the revitalization of communities across the State;

Whereas Senator Riegle led an investigation into the illnesses being experienced by veterans of the Gulf War and in 1994 released The Riegle Report to the United States Senate, which concluded that United States Gulf War veterans were likely exposed to low-level chemical and biological agents and called for further Government investigation into, and recourse for, war veterans suffering from Gulf War syndrome;

Whereas Senator Riegle was known for his independence, integrity, and willingness to work across party lines in the interest of the people of the United States;

Whereas, after leaving public office, Senator Riegle continued to contribute to public life through his work in academia, policy, and civic engagement;

Whereas Donald W. Riegle, Jr., passed away on Friday, April 24, 2026, at the age of 88, leaving behind a legacy of dedicated public service and commitment to the people of Michigan and the United States;

Whereas Senator Riegle is survived by his loving wife of 48 years, Lori Hansen Riegle, 5 children, 10 grandchildren, and 1 great-grandson; and

Whereas Senator Riegle is remembered by his family, friends, former colleagues, and all those who benefited from his leadership and service: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Senate—

(1) has heard with profound sorrow and deep regret the announcement of the death of Donald W. Riegle, Jr., former member of the Senate;

(2) honors the life and legacy of former United States Senator Donald W. Riegle, Jr., for his decades of service to the State of Michigan and the United States, and expresses its deep condolences to his family and loved ones;

(3) directs the Secretary of the Senate to communicate this resolution to the House of Representatives and transmit an enrolled copy of this resolution to the family of Donald W. Riegle, Jr.; and

(4) when the Senate adjourns on the date of the adoption of this resolution, the Senate stands adjourned as a further mark of respect to the memory of the Honorable Donald W. Riegle, Jr.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 34—RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF SAVING LIVES, REDUCING GUN VIOLENCE, AND STRENGTHENING PUBLIC SAFETY AS THE UNITED STATES CELEBRATES ITS 250TH ANNIVERSARY

Ms. ALSOBROOKS (for herself, Mr. SCHIFF, Mr. BOOKER, Mr. PADILLA, Mr. VAN HOLLEN, Mr. HICKENLOOPER, and Ms. HIRONO) submitted the following concurrent resolution; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary:

S. CON. RES. 34

Whereas the United States commemorates its 250th anniversary in 2026, marking a historic milestone in its democratic journey;

Whereas the promise of the United States includes ensuring the safety, security, and well-being of all people and communities;

Whereas gun violence remains a leading cause of death and injury in the United States, impacting families, communities,

and the public health and economic stability of the United States;

Whereas the United States continues to lead the world in the number of gun deaths, with an average of 125 people killed by guns each day;

Whereas there are over 400,000,000 guns in the United States, but only 340,000,000 people in the United States;

Whereas 1 in 5 people in the United States will personally witness someone being shot;

Whereas people of all communities, including veterans and children, are not immune to the pull of the trigger;

Whereas evidence-informed solutions—including community violence intervention, Federal background checks, effective law enforcement partnerships, and responsible public safety policies—have been shown to reduce gun violence and save lives;

Whereas survivors of gun violence, community leaders, public safety professionals, and advocates play a vital role in advancing effective solutions to improve public safety;

Whereas reducing gun violence is essential to protecting communities and ensuring all people of the United States can live free from preventable harm;

Whereas saving lives and safeguarding the well-being of the people of the United States is a fundamental responsibility of government; and

Whereas the 250th anniversary of the United States presents an opportunity to renew the commitment of the United States to protecting lives and strengthening public safety for future generations: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives concurring), That Congress—

(1) recognizes the 250th anniversary of the United States as a moment to reaffirm a national commitment to saving lives, reducing gun violence, and strengthening public safety;

(2) honors the lives lost to gun violence and provides support for survivors, families, and communities impacted;

(3) commends the efforts of community leaders, law enforcement, public health professionals, community violence intervention practitioners, and advocates working to prevent gun violence and promote safety;

(4) prioritizes support for law enforcement efforts to collect and publish data about violent crimes, improve clearance rates for homicides and shootings, and expand training in deescalation tactics;

(5) supports expanded investment in proactive, community-based strategies that stop violence before it occurs by identifying individuals at high risk and intervening with credible messengers and customized services that address the root causes of violence;

(6) commits to ensuring robust funding for victim services so many can take the first steps towards recovery;

(7) affirms that preventing gun violence and saving lives must be a national priority as the United States enters its next 250 years; and

(8) pursues policies that strengthen public safety, uphold constitutional rights, and protect the well-being of all people of the United States.
