#### INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

S. 4788. A bill to amend the Child Care and Development Block Grant Act of 1990 to withhold funds from noncompliant States under such Act; to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions.

S. 4791. A bill to abolish the Anti-Weaponization Fund, and for other purposes; to the Committee on the Judiciary.

By Mrs. MOODY:

S. 4792. A bill to prohibit civil liability actions from being brought or continued against manufacturers and sellers of stone slab products for damages, injunctive, or other relief resulting from the misuse of their products by others; to the Committee on the Judiciary.

By Mr. SCOTT of South Carolina (for himself and Mrs. BRITT):

S. 4793. A bill to clarify provisions of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement Implementation Act and the Foreign Trade Zones Act with respect to the appropriate tariff treatment of merchandise in a United States foreign-trade zone, and for other purposes; to the Committee on Finance.

S. 4795. A bill to amend the Energy Act of 2020 to establish enforceable Federal authorization timelines and expedited judicial remedies, to limit Federal actions halting fully permitted projects, and for other purposes; to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

S. 4800. A bill to protect free speech by repealing the ground for deportability under section 237(a)(4)(C) of the Immigration and Nationality Act relating to aliens whose presence or activities in the United States are reasonably believed to have serious adverse foreign policy consequences; to the Committee on the Judiciary.

By Mr. MORAN (for himself, Ms. ROSEN, Mr. SHEEHY, Ms. DUCKWORTH, Mr. CRAPO, Mr. BLUMENTHAL, Mr. RISCH, and Mr. BOOKER):

S. 4801. A bill to amend laws relating to duty performed by members of the reserve components of the Armed Forces, and for other purposes; to the Committee on Armed Services.

S. 1088

At the request of Mrs. SHAHEEN, the name of the Senator from Colorado (Mr. BENNET) was added as a cosponsor of S. 1088, a bill to provide that the memorial to commemorate the sacrifice and service of the women who worked on the home front to support the efforts of the United States military during World War II may be located on the National Mall, and for other purposes.

S. 1294

At the request of Mr. DURBIN, the name of the Senator from Maryland (Ms. ALSOBROOKS) was added as a cosponsor of S. 1294, a bill to modernize the business of selling firearms.

At the request of Ms. BALDWIN, the names of the Senator from Illinois (Mr. DURBIN) and the Senator from Hawaii (Mr. SCHATZ) were added as cosponsors of S. 2195, a bill to award a Congressional Gold Medal, collectively, to the brave women who served in World War II as members of the U.S. Army Nurse Corps and U.S. Navy Nurse Corps.

S. 2265

At the request of Mr. PADILLA, the names of the Senator from Connecticut (Mr. MURPHY), the Senator from Montana (Mr. SHEEHY), the Senator from Illinois (Ms. DUCKWORTH), the Senator from South Dakota (Mr. ROUNDS), the Senator from Ohio (Mr. MORENO) and the Senator from Rhode Island (Mr. WHITEHOUSE) were added as cosponsors of S. 2265, a bill to require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games in Los Angeles, California, and the 2034 Olympics and Paralympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah.

S. 2426

At the request of Mr. THUNE, the names of the Senator from Pennsylvania (Mr. MCCORMICK) and the Senator from Oregon (Mr. MERKLEY) were added as cosponsors of S. 2426, a bill to amend title XVIII of the Social Security Act to provide pharmacy payment of certain services.

S. 2828

At the request of Mrs. FISCHER, the name of the Senator from Alabama (Mrs. BRITT) was added as a cosponsor of S. 2828, a bill to amend the Child Care and Development Block Grant Act of 1990 to reauthorize and update the Act, and for other purposes.

S. 3048

At the request of Ms. MURKOWSKI, the name of the Senator from Montana (Mr. DAINES) was added as a cosponsor of S. 3048, a bill to amend the Controlled Substances Act to allow for the use of telehealth in substance use disorder treatment, and for other purposes.
