REMEMBERING LARRY MAZZOLA, SR.

● Mr. PADILLA. Madam President, I rise today to honor the life and legacy of Larry Mazzola, Sr., a towering figure in California's labor movement, a proud San Franciscan, and a relentless advocate for working people who passed away in early May at the age of 82.

Larry leaves behind a powerful legacy that helped shape the Bay Area labor movement, as well as the lives of countless workers and families across California.

For decades, Larry Mazzola, Sr., stood as one of San Francisco's most respected and formidable voices for organized labor, a legacy deeply rooted in family tradition.

His father Joseph Mazzola led San Francisco's plumbers union for more than four decades, instilling in Larry a deep commitment to solidarity, dignity, and the belief that every worker deserves fair wages, safe working conditions, and the opportunity to provide for their family.

Larry carried that mission forward throughout his life and career, and passed it on to his own son Larry Mazzola, Jr., who continues the family tradition as the head of U.A. Local 38 and president of the San Francisco Building and Construction Trades Council.

A native son of San Francisco, Larry dedicated nearly 50 years of his life to U.A. Local 38 and the United Association, serving in wide-ranging roles including assistant training director, organizer, business agent, and ultimately, 24 years as business manager and financial secretary-treasurer.

Through his leadership, he helped guide generations of workers into the middle class and fought tirelessly to secure family-supporting wages, quality healthcare, strong retirement benefits, and safe workplaces for workers across the Bay Area.

Larry's leadership helped establish some of the strongest labor standards in the Nation and ensured that thousands of workers could retire with dignity after a lifetime of hard work. His impact on the labor movement was so

profound that U.A. Local 38's union hall is named in his honor.

Larry also served the people of San Francisco with distinction as a member of the San Francisco Airport Commission for 26 years, including nearly 18 years as its president. Even in public office, Larry never lost sight of where he came from or whom he represented. He brought the same unwavering advocacy for working people into government service, protecting the rights, wages, and benefits of union workers at San Francisco International Airport and setting an example for labor representation in public institutions nationwide.

In recognition of Larry's extraordinary contributions to the city, San Francisco declared a "Larry Mazzola Sr. Day" when he retired from the airport commission in 2022, a fitting honor for someone whose life's work left an indelible mark on the city he loved.

Larry Mazzola, Sr., devoted his life to fighting for working people and ensuring that future generations would have greater opportunity and security than the generations before them. His impact can still be felt in the strength of organized labor throughout the Bay Area and in the countless workers and families whose lives were improved through his advocacy and leadership.

Angela and I send our deepest condolences to the entire Mazzola family, to his brothers and sisters in labor, and to all those whose lives he touched through his decades of service and leadership.●

REMEMBERING DAN CAUDILL

Madam President, I rise today to honor the life and legacy of Dan Caudill, a respected Kentucky business leader and a principled advocate for criminal justice reform, who passed away in December 2025. Dan was not merely a supporter of reform in theory; he lived it through his work and deeds. His testimony provided real-world evidence that reform is not only compassionate, but practical and economi-

cally sound. Dan Caudill's voice carried the moral clarity of experience, not ideology. His legacy will endure in the lives he lifted up, the reforms he championed, and the enduring reminder that a just society must always leave room for second chances.●

TRIBUTE TO TERRY MCINTOSH

● Mr. PAUL. Madam President, I rise today to honor the service of a true American patriot, Terry McIntosh of Paducah, KY.

At the age of 17, motivated by a sense of duty to his country during the Vietnam war, Terry enlisted in the United States Army. Despite his youth, he would soon find himself on the frontlines, eventually assigned to Operational Detachment A-414, a Green Beret "A-team" operating along the Cambodian border. For his service in combat, which included multiple missions and a February 1969 firefight that

earned him the Combat Infantryman Badge, Mr. McIntosh stood shoulder-to-shoulder with the elite of our Armed Forces.

For decades, the formal recognition of this service remained elusive. It was not until March 2026, following a review of his personnel records, that the Army retroactively awarded Mr. McIntosh the Special Forces tab—a long-overdue acknowledgment of his status as a Green Beret.

Mr. McIntosh's story is a testament to the quiet professionalism of the soldiers who did the job without the need for fanfare or special recognition. As he noted, he sought this recognition not for himself, but so his children would know the nature of his service to this Nation.

It is my privilege to recognize Mr. McIntosh today. His dedication at such a young age is an inspiration to all who value the courage of those who wear the uniform. We honor his service, we celebrate his official recognition as a Green Beret, and we thank him for his enduring commitment to this country.●

TRIBUTE TO OFFICER JOSH MCKINLEY

● Mr. PAUL. Madam President, I rise today to recognize Officer Josh McKinley for an extraordinary act of courage, compassion, and public service that saved a life and exemplifies the very best of law enforcement.

On March 21, 2026, Officer McKinley responded to a critical incident on the Big Four Walking Bridge in Louisville, KY, involving an individual who had climbed over the bridge railing, was seated on the outside ledge, and was threatening to end his life. The situation demanded extraordinary judgment, patience, and calm under immense pressure.

Officer McKinley immediately took the lead in communicating with the individual. Rather than relying on force or haste, he relied on empathy, respect, and genuine human connection. For nearly an hour, Officer McKinley remained engaged in conversation, patiently building trust while demonstrating unwavering professionalism and compassion. Through his calm demeanor and steadfast commitment, he persuaded the individual to safely climb back over the railing, preventing what could have been a tragic loss of life.

Officer McKinley's service did not end once the immediate danger had passed. He offered a meal and continued emotional support before ensuring he was transported to a hospital where he could receive the medical treatment and assistance he needed.

The actions displayed by Officer McKinley reflect the highest ideals of law enforcement. His courage was measured not only in his willingness to face danger but also in his patience, compassion, and determination to preserve life. His professionalism serves as

an example for officers across the Commonwealth of Kentucky and our Nation.

I ask my colleagues to join me in recognizing Officer Josh McKinley for his extraordinary service. His selfless actions on March 21, 2026, undoubtedly saved a life, brought hope to a person in despair, and remind us all of the difference one dedicated public servant can make.●
