By 15 yeas to 84 nays (Vote No. 138), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Tillis Amendment No. 5452 (to Amendment No. 5453), to reallocate funds that would have been used for the Anti-Weaponization Fund to fraud enforcement. Subsequently, the point of order that the measure would cause the underlying legislation to exceed the Judiciary Committee's section 305(f) allocation of new budget authority or outlays, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Pages S2549–51**

By 53 yeas to 46 nays (Vote No. 139), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Merkley Amendment No. 5512 (to Amendment No. 5453), to provide a clarification relating to, and to prohibit the use of funds for, the White House Ballroom. Subsequently, the point of order under section 305(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell.

By 46 yeas to 53 nays (Vote No. 140), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Reed Amendment No. 5514 (to Amendment No. 5453), to provide funding for the HOME Investment Partnership program. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell.

**Pages S2551–52**

By 46 yeas to 52 nays (Vote No. 142), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Hassan Amendment No. 5535 (to Amendment No. 5453), to help build 7,000,000 new homes. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell.

By 49 yeas to 49 nays (Vote No. 143), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Warner Amendment No. 5556 (to Amendment No. 5453), to prohibit an individual from acting as Director of National Intelligence if such individual is simultaneously serving as the head of any other Federal department or agency. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell.

**Pages S2553–54**

By 48 yeas to 50 nays (Vote No. 144), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected a motion to waive with respect to Graham Amendment No. 5779 (to Amendment No. 5453), to ensure only citizens are registered to vote in elections for Federal office, and to require voters to provide photo identi-

fication. Subsequently, the point of order that the Amendment violates the “Byrd Rule” section 313(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained, and the amendment thus fell.

**Pages S2554–55**

By 51 yeas to 47 nays (Vote No. 145), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Hickenlooper Amendment No. 5501 (to Amendment No. 5453), to prohibit the distribution of Federal funds to individuals convicted of certain crimes. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell.

**Pages S2555–56**

By 46 yeas to 53 nays (Vote No. 146), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Kim Amendment No. 5545 (to Amendment No. 5453), to make appropriations for the conduct of inspections of the Delaney Hall Detention Facility. Subsequently, the point of order that the measure would cause the underlying legislation to exceed the Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee’s section 302(f) allocation of new budget authority or outlays, was sustained and the amendment thus fell.

By 45 yeas to 53 nays (Vote No. 148), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Sanders Amendment No. 5451 (to Amendment No. 5453), to place reasonable limits on contributions to Super PACs which made independent expenditures. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell.

**Pages S2558–59**

By 46 yeas to 53 nays (Vote No. 149), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Baldwin Amendment No. 5485 (to Amendment No. 5453), to redirect funding for U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement to the Child Care and Development Block Grant program. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional

Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Pages S2559–60**

By 46 yeas to 53 nays (Vote No. 150), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Booker Amendment No. 5803 (to Amendment No. 5453), to support the work performed by the Immigration Detention Ombudsman. Subsequently, the point of order that the measure would cause the underlying legislation to exceed the Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee's section 302(f) allocation of new budget authority or outlays, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Page S2560**

By 50 yeas to 49 nays (Vote No. 151), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Lee Amendment No. 5804 (to Amendment No. 5453), to ensure that only citizens are registered to vote in elections for Federal office, and to require voters to provide photo identification. Subsequently, the point of order under section 305(b)(2) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Pages S2560–61**

By 48 yeas to 51 nays (Vote No. 152), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Durbin Amendment No. 5806 (to Amendment No. 5453), to repurpose funds previously appropriated for U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement for the timely processing of DACA applications and related employment authorization documents and to prohibit the use of funds to arrest, detain, deport, or remove DACA recipients. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(1)(a) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Pages S2561–62**

By 54 yeas to 45 nays (Vote No. 158), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Coons Amendment No. 5457 (to Amendment No. 5453), to prohibit the Department of Justice from using taxpayer funds to make settlement payments to individuals convicted of assaulting law enforcement officers on January 6, 2021. Subsequently, the point of order under

section 313(b)(1)(c) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Pages S2565–66**

By 52 yeas to 47 nays (Vote No. 159), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Cassidy/Van Hollen Amendment No. 5812 (to Amendment No. 5453), to provide compensation to law enforcement officers who defended the United States Capitol during the events that occurred at or near the United States Capitol on January 6, 2021. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(d) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Pages S2566–67**

By 53 yeas to 46 nays (Vote No. 161), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Van Hollen Amendment No. 5632 (to Amendment No. 5453), to prohibit the use of funds to provide payments to certain individuals. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(a) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Page S2568**

By 51 yeas to 48 nays (Vote No. 162), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and all applicable budget points of order for purposes of Schiff Amendment No. 5740 (to Amendment No. 5453), to provide for limitations on judgments, awards, and compromise settlements under section 1304 of title 31, United States Code. Subsequently, the point of order under section 313(b)(1)(a) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, was sustained and the amendment thus fell. **Pages S2568–69**

#### House Messages:

**Foreign Intelligence Accountability Act:** By 47 yeas to 52 nays (Vote No. 164), Senate did not agree to the motion to proceed to the amendment of the House of Representatives to S. 1318, to direct the American Battle Monuments Commission to establish a program to identify American-Jewish servicemembers buried in United States military cemeteries overseas under markers that incorrectly represent their religion and heritage. **Page S2571**

**Mattivi Nomination—Cloture:** Senate began consideration of the nomination of Anthony W. Mattivi,

Res. 1336, waiving a requirement of clause 6(a) of rule XIII with respect to consideration of certain resolutions reported from the Committee on Rules, by a recorded vote of 213 yeas to 211 noes, Roll No. 203, after the previous question was ordered by a yea-and-nay vote of 212 yeas to 210 nays, Roll No. 202. **Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agency Appropriations Act, 2027:** The House passed H.R. 8646, making appropriations for Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies programs for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2027, by a yea-and-nay vote of 213 yeas to 210 nays, Roll No. 205.

Rept. 119–676: Boebert (No. 1) that redirects \$2 million in funding from Office of General Counsel to the Office of the Inspector General to prevent waste, fraud, and abuse; Boebert (No. 2) that redirects \$2 million in funding from FPAC Business Center to the Farm Service Agency; Boebert (No. 3) that redirects \$2 million in funding from Office of the Chief Information Officer to Rural Development Programs; Boebert (No. 4) that redirects \$2 million in funding from Office of the Chief Information Officer to Rural Utilities Service; Boebert (No. 5) that redirects \$2 million in funding from Office of the Chief Information Officer to the Natural Resources Conservation Service Conservation Operations; Buchanan (No. 6) that increases and decreases the USDA Office of Inspector General by \$2 million for the purposes of enforcing existing animal fighting statutes; Figures (No. 7) that increases and decreases the United States Commodity Futures Trading Commission

(CFTC) account by \$2 million to encourage the CFTC to create a pilot program focused on improving digital access and financial literacy in rural communities; Figures (No. 8) that increases and decreases the Distance Learning, Telemedicine, and Broadband Program account by \$1 million to prioritize telemedicine and distance learning grant applications from rural applicants located more than 30 miles from a federally qualified health center or community mental health center, with a focus on those providing mental health and substance use disorder services; Flood (No. 9) that redirects \$500,000 from the Office of the Chief Financial Officer to support the National Drought Mitigation Center to maintain and update critical drought-related tools used by producers, water-managers, and USDA; enhance new monitoring and modeling; and support USDA in anticipating and reducing the effects of extreme weather on U.S. agricultural producers, livestock, and the economy; Gosar (No. 10) that transfers \$2 million from the Chief Information Officer to APHIS port of entry inspections for New World Screwworm; Leger Fernandez (No. 11) that increases and decreases funding for the Agricultural Research Service by \$1,000,000 for the purpose of conducting a comprehensive study on large-scale algae-based production for agricultural and livestock uses; Malliotakis (No. 12) that prohibits funding for the Center for Drug Evaluation and Research, Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research, or Center for Devices and Radiological Health within the Food and Drug Administration to issue or finalize guidance recommending or requiring testing in dogs; Malliotakis (No. 13) that prohibits the National Institute of Food and Agriculture within the Department of Agriculture from funding painful research on dogs and cats; Ogles (No. 14) that ensures FDA does not deprioritize review, inspection, import screening, or shortage-mitigation activities for sterile injectable cancer drugs that are currently listed in shortage and keeps the agency focused on restoring access to critical cancer treatments without weakening FDA’s safety standards; Pettersen (No. 16) that increases and decreases the National Institute of Food and Agriculture, Research and Education Activities by \$10,000,000 for the purposes of research using data and tools available from commercial weather services for wildfire and drought mitigation measures; Stanton (No. 17) that increases and decreases the Farm Services Agency account by \$5 million to provide funding for USDA to revise the Livestock Indemnity Program and Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program to provide compensation to producers for both confirmed and probable Mexican wolf attacks on

livestock; Stanton (No. 18) that increases and decreases funding for the Agricultural Research Service by \$2 million for the purpose of conducting research on soil erosion and soil health in the arid and semi-arid West to reduce risk of exposure to coccidiodomycosis, or “Valley Fever”; Subramanyam (No. 21) that increase and decrease the value-added agricultural product market development grants account by \$10,000,000 to emphasize the importance of value-added agricultural businesses and agritourism farms in the health of American farm economy; Sykes (No. 22) that increases and decreases funding for the Food and Drug Administration by \$1 million to emphasize the importance of infant formula and toddler food safety and to demonstrate support for the FDA to consider requiring manufacturers to implement an environmental monitoring regime for contaminants, including *cronobacter* spp., salmonella, and botulism; Thompson (CA) (No. 23) that increases/decreases \$7,000,000 to APHIS Account to provide needed funding to address the Glassy Wing Sharp Shooter infestation discovered in California; Thompson (PA) (No. 24) that provides \$2 million to fund the Grants for Youth Organizations program; decreases the Office of the General Counsel by \$2 million; Vasquez (No. 25) that increases and decreases funding by \$2 million for addressing challenges facing chile pepper production in the southwest and researching chile pepper farming through precision, data-driven cultivation using AI-powered innovation; and Vindman (No. 26) that redirects \$2,500,000 from USDA Office of the Chief Information Officer to fund the Binational Agricultural Research and Development (BARD) Food Security Accelerator. **Pages 3860–62**

*Committee on Armed Services:* Full Committee held a markup on H.R. 8800, the “National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2027”. H.R. 8800 was ordered reported, as amended.

### EXAMINING THE POLICIES AND PRIORITIES OF THE NATIONAL LABOR RELATIONS BOARD

*Committee on Education and Workforce:* Subcommittee on Health, Employment, Labor, and Pensions held a hearing entitled “Examining the Policies and Priorities of the NLRB”.
